TAFT PRAISES STATE DISPLAY AT SAN DIEGO

Ex-President Revisits New Mexico Building and Finds Community's Progress Since Statehood Praiseworthy.

George H. Taft, the Silver City mining magnate, said today that he was very much pleased with the state display. He is a keen, appropriate, country of New Mexico, and will do the state a great deal of good. He likes the lectures and pictures and is well pleased with the entire method of display.

United States Senator Thomas H. Catron spent almost an entire forenoon in the building and was pleased immensely, especially with the architectural and historical end of the display, the showing made by the forest service and the mineral exhibit.

Mr. Taft said that he always had a sort of personal interest in New Mexico as he was elected president of the United States before he had been in its territory. He had visited the New Mexico building before and that he had heard the display was entirely different.

Mr. Taft also commented on the historical collection and exhibit in the Hall of the Governors. He recognized the portrait of Gov. W. J. Mills, his appointee, and carefully read the inscription at the bottom of the picture.

Mr. Taft then was shown the auditorium. Here he stopped and carefully looked the beautiful room over from all sides by picture gallery. Then he said: "This is really wonderful—a credit to any country."

Mr. Taft remarked that he could not stay longer but on leaving the building he said that the Sunshine state had made a wonderful display, one that would do it a world of good, and that the benefits would be felt for many years.
