VICTORIA CROSS AWARDED TO FIVE MORE ARMY MEN

Four of Coveted Tokens of Valor Given for Extreme Bravery in Use of Bombs in France and East.

London, Sept. 24.—The award of five additional Victoria crosses is announced in the London Gazette. Four of these were for "most conspicuous bravery" in connection with bomb throwing operations.

On the night of July 12, 1915, when it was essential that a portion of a trench which had been lost should be regained, Captain O'Sullivan, although not belonging to the troops at this point, volunteered to lead a party of bomb throwers to effect the recovery.

On the night of June 18-19, 1915, Captain O'Sullivan saved a critical situation in the same locality by his great personal gallantry and good leadership.

On the day following this an hour-long battle was fought in the trench in the official casualty list, giving Captain O'Sullivan in the list of "missing."

What Second Lieutenant Herbert James of the West Yorkshire regiment did in the trench is thus described: "On the 28th of June, 1915, when a portion of a trench had been recaptured, owing to the efforts of my company, I was ordered to lead a party of bomb throwers to effect the recovery of the trench."

On the 2nd of July in the same locality, he headed a party of bomb throwers on a Turkish trench. He was killed by a Turkish machine gun bullet in the head, but he remained on his feet until he had thrown his last bomb.

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ATROCITIES OF ABOUT HUNDRED REIGN OUTDONE

Five Hundred Thousand Christians in Armenia Murdered or Sent Into Deserts of Arabia to Die of Starvation.

New York, Sept. 26.—A statement containing the testimony of Armenian refugees in Turkey as given in a report to the United States Congress by the committee on Armenian affairs, the statement follows: "A sub-committee has thoroughly investigated the evidence and has made a report to the committee containing the testimony of every refugee who has been received by the United States regarding the Armenian atrocities."

Evidence Unquestionable.

Witnesses examined include Armenians, Greeks, Bulgarians, Italians, Germans, Turks, Englishmen and Americans of rank.

Not a single statement was questioned. These witnesses, who have been in Turkey for many years, have been examined by the committee and their statements are being carried on by the Turkish government.

Horrible Cruelty.

The statements examined show that the Armenians were not only killed but also sent into the deserts of Arabia to die of starvation.
