DR. AMES, MAN WHO REARED MANY CHILDREN, DEAD

He and His Wife, Who Were Childless, Said to Have Taken Care of at Least Ten Orphans.

Dr. T. G. Ames, who came here when Albuquerque was young and who was a practicing dentist here at one time, died yesterday at a hospital, aged about 72 years.

The aged dentist was well known by many citizens, although the latter, because of his retirement, know him as well because of his retirement. At one time Dr. Ames was more than well-to-do, owning a great deal of property here. He and Mrs. Ames, his wife who is dead, reared several orphan children—about ten, as nearly as friends could recall. They had no children of their own.

Had Dr. Ames died just one day longer he would have died on the fifth anniversary of the death of his wife, who died here five years ago today. She is buried at Fairview cemetery. The body of the aged dentist may be buried there also, although arrangements depend upon the wishes of his brother, Fred, who lives in Chicago. C. T. French, undertaker, who has charge of the body, sent a telegram to him yesterday, informing him of the death of the dentist. Dr. Ames was an active member of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, and played a prominent part in the building of that church here.

Had Little House Near River. For several years Dr. Ames lived alone in a little house near the east approach of the Barleta bridge. He raised poultry and rabbits there. The Rio Grande flooded his little farm once, drowning some of his ducks and rabbits. He presented a claim to Bernalillo county but got nothing. Twice in the last few years his house was robbed and clothes taken. The police recovered them after the first robbery.

Although the Ames family was English, Dr. Ames was born in Paris, France. He spent his boyhood in Canada and came to Albuquerque fully thirty-five years ago.

D. W. GRIFFITH'S RISE REGARDED AS PHENOMENON

Director of "The Birth of a Nation" Ascended From Extra Man; One of Pioneers in Multiple Reel Pictures.

In contemplating the wonderful success of "The Birth of a Nation," the mighty spectacle now at the Crystal for the week, we recall the phenomenal rise of David W. Griffith, now conceded to be the David Boissac of the silent drama. He was an extra man with one of the Boissac companies. Griffith even then had unusual ideas and was eagerly awaiting for the opportunity that would put them into execution. One day, quite as much to Griffith's surprise as to that of any of his associates, he was made assistant director with the company. Then it was that Griffith gave them a taste of his quality. Under his tutelage a new generation of film stars began to develop. He was one of the pioneers of the multiple reel picture, leading that given a big enough subject, several thousand feet of film could be used to excellent advantage in the development of the theme. Gradually the Griffith brand of feature pictures became known from coast to coast.

Studied Period Closely. Not Griffith wasn't resting on present laurels, he had an eye to the future, and one day announced his readiness to begin work on "The Birth of a Nation." Griffith had spent months in study of his subject, which was to be founded on "The Clansman," the novel by Thomas Dixon. Griffith had dug deep into the archives of the civil war period, had covered the historic ground where the great battles had been waged, and studied the manners and customs of the period. He saw in his mind's eye something new in pictures, something that almost makes the use of the word a misnomer. And the result has been the eighth wonder of the world, a re-creation of the civil war and its aftermath, that almost begins words in attempting to describe it.

The big company of thirty-five people, including a grand symphony orchestra of twenty-four professional musicians are carried by the management. Matinees are being given daily to large and enthusiastic audiences and evening performances are attended by immense crowds of citizens as well as hundreds who come by auto and train from all the nearby towns.
