

HEIR TO BRITISH THRONE SEEKING WIFE, IS REPORT

Prince Edward Albert of Wales, It Is Believed, Would Marry Daughter of King Victor Emanuel of Italy.

(Associated Press Correspondence.) Rome, June 27.—Unconfirmed reports that Prince Edward Albert of Wales, heir apparent to the British throne, seeks the hand of Princess Yolanda, the eldest daughter of King Victor Emanuel of Italy, have excited widespread discussion here. The rumor is a surprise to Italians generally, for it had been supposed that the British prince would marry one of the daughters of Emperor Nicholas of Russia, but there are a number of incidents that have led the Italian people to believe that Prince Edward will marry the Princess Yolanda. It is now stated that the reason of the suit of the Duke of Connaught to the Italian king in May was to present the formal request of the King and Queen of England for the hand of the Princess Yolanda. The princess is only 15 years old, and the prince is only 25. She received an English education from babyhood under the tutelage of an English governess, Miss Brown, and those who know her intimately have spoken of her as one of the best marriageable prospects in European royal families. She is said to be an extremely sensible and practical girl, having been brought up in a family that is peculiarly domestic, and being the oldest girl in the family, her royal intimates say she has been regarded as the "boss" of the household. She has always acted as the protectress of her younger sisters and her brother, Prince Humbert. Sometimes she has extended this role even to her mother, the queen. The princess on one occasion recently, when speaking to the American wife of an Italian journalist, said: "I rarely attempt to speak English because Yolanda insists on correcting my mistakes."

IRON MINES OF SARDINIA BEING WORKED BY ITALY

Absence of Much Needed Ore at Home Compels Italians to Seek Relief From Treasure Stores of Historic Island

(Associated Press Correspondence.) Rome, June 26.—The iron mines of the island of Sardinia, worked in the time of the Roman republic to obtain metal for the arms of her legions, are today being worked by the Italians in their need for artillery munitions. Never in her history, according to a writer in the Idea Nazionale, a daily newspaper, has Italy felt the need of iron or so recognized the lack of it in her soil.

of the large countries of the world, barring Japan, Italy's soil is the poorest in iron ore, despite her ease in developing the mines she possesses. She yearly produces over 500,000 tons of pig iron, as compared to upwards of 3,000,000 tons in the United States, or 19,000,000 in England, 2,000,000 in Germany, and 2,200,000 in Austria-Hungary, the country with which she is at war. The progress of Italy as an iron producer has, however, been rapid. In the year 1890 she was producing but 15,000 tons of pig iron, as compared to 375,000 tons in 1911. In this war year it is estimated that her production, stimulated by the needs of her artillery and the high ocean freights from the United States, will be considerably greater than in normal years. The mountainous country of the mainland of Italy's territory, including the Alps and the Apennines, yields but little iron. The best part of it comes from the islands of Sicily and Sardinia. The mines of Caltanissetta in Sicily produce some \$6,000,000 worth of ore. Another \$4,000,000 worth is mined in the districts about Florence, another million dollars' worth comes from Bologna, while smaller values come from mines near Naples, Rome, Milan and Turin. The next largest value comes out of the ancient mines of Sardinia, which produce a value of over \$4,000,000 normally. In peace years, and which are being worked under pressure this year. Superintendent Conway for an hour today addressed the institute of Indian teachers and employees, being interrupted again and again by cheers. Women Ask Library Fund. Santa Fe, July 8.—In an effort to have open to the library every day as in the past, a committee of the Santa Fe Woman's Board of Trade appeared before city council last evening and asked for a monthly appropriation of \$50 in lieu of the levy that had been cut off some time ago because of the illegality. The republicans who control the city administration from top to bottom, had pledged themselves during the spring campaign to revive financial support of the library. The city council declared that for the present it had no funds to divert for the public library, but promised informally to include the desired funds in the budget for the next fiscal year.

Livestock Company Increases Capital. Santa Fe, July 8.—The Navajo Livestock and Trading company, of Gallup, today increased its capital stock from \$50,000 to \$100,000, according to a certificate filed today with the state corporation commission.

State Board After Healers. Santa Fe, July 8.—The state board of health is relentlessly prosecuting healers. In addition to several convictions secured recently at Roswell against practitioners without a license, it has just secured the conviction of Luciano Cordeiro at Anthony, Dona Ana county. Cordeiro was sentenced to sixty days in the county jail, Narciso Catilla, charged with the same offense, was acquitted. The case grew out of the arrest of the parish priest who had responded to a call for the last infection and confession but was put out of the house by the son of the woman who had summoned him. Cordeiro is the member of a "healers' club" having 200 members in the Mesilla valley, who are pledged against calling in a regular physician and believe in the laying on of hands as sufficient for the cure of disease. In Rio Arriba and Taos counties, too, an active propaganda is to be made against herb doctors and unskilled midwives, who have flourished in the past because of the lack of regular physicians in the more remote settlements.

Assessment Rolls Near Completion. Santa Fe, July 8.—The assessment roll of Santa Fe county will be completed next week, two months after rolls having been already received by the tax commission. In this connection it is of interest that the assessment of Arizona, with two-thirds the population of New Mexico, over third the railroads and considerably less area, totals \$450,000,000 this year, the assessment on mines alone having been increased \$57,000,000 on account of the great prosperity that has come to copper mines. As a consequence the state tax rate is to be cut to 10 cents on the \$100.

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MOUNTAINAIR VISITORS TO HAVE MORE TIME FOR RECREATION THIS YEAR
