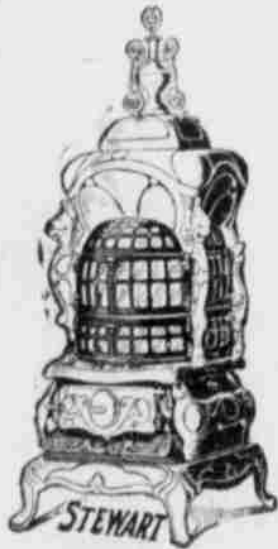

Cold Weather in Dakota Sioux Falls, S. D., Sept. 15—Temperatures as low as 23 were recorded in various parts of the state last night. Most of the corn is practically beyond danger, but melons, cucumbers and other garden products suffered.

GERMAN POLICY IN BELGIUM ONE OF SPOILATION, MINISTER AVERS

Little Kingdom, Already Torn to Pieces by War, Is Being Preyed Upon, According to Statement Issued.

THREATEN TO ARREST ALL BANK DIRECTORS

One Man Has Been Taken to Aix-la-Chapelle, Where He Wears Prison Garb; Treated With Greatest Brutality.

London, Sept. 15.—The Belgian minister of finance, Aelers von de Vyver, has issued the following note: "According to news from authorized sources, the German authorities of occupation are pursuing against the Belgians a policy of spoliation of ever greater magnitude than that denounced by the Belgian minister of finance, after the first reports in the Dutch press.

PARALYSIS SITUATION BECOMES ENCOURAGING

New York, Sept. 15.—Although a slight increase in the infantile paralysis epidemic was reported today by the health authorities, the number of cases discovered increasing from thirty-six to forty-two within twenty-four hours, city officials said they saw no reason for added alarm, and plans were announced for keeping it under control.

WOMAN'S COMMITTEE

New York, Sept. 15.—William H. Wilcox, chairman of the republican national committee, today announced the appointment of a woman's campaign committee, to assist in the Hughes campaign. The committee will work with state committees and with the women's committee of the Hughes alliance.

RATIONING PLANS ARE SET ASIDE BY ENGLAND'S ORDER

No Further License Will Be Granted Now for Sending Food to Neutrals; American Shipments to Holland Stop.

London, Sept. 15, Thursday.—(Delayed.)—The plan of rationing the neutral countries of Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Holland, under which no further licenses will be granted for the present to British exporters, has been extended to apply to the United States by the Netherlands Overseas Trust to accept further American consignments, and by declining to grant letters of assurance for American shipments destined for those countries.

Neutral diplomats here believe two reasons induced the British government to take this action. The first is the simplicity of the plan which enables the government to control supplies at the source. The second is the growing bill with which Great Britain is being pressed by neutral governments for demurrage and other expenses incurred by taking suspected ships into Kirkwall and other ports for examination.

imports. Official confirmation has been received that such an arrangement has been consummated, but until its effects are understood no formal protest will be made. Legal authorities of the department believe, however, that such a plan is in contravention of the British-American commercial treaty of 1815, which provides for free access of nationals and ships of the respective countries and unrestricted commerce unless prohibitions of commerce apply alike to all countries.

CALL FOR ASSEMBLY ISSUED BY CARRANZA

Mexico City, Sept. 15.—General Carranza's purposes in issuing last night a call for the election of delegates to an assembly to consider changes in the constitution are set forth in the plan of Guadalupe adopted in 1912, and enlarged at Vera Cruz in 1914. It says the constitutional program provided that when their cause was triumphant and municipal elections had been held, the first chief should call for the election of a congress, give an account of his administration and have his actions ratified or modified by congress. He then was to call a presidential election and turn over executive authority to the legally elected president.

Carranza's decree declares enemies of the constitutionists have omitted nothing to prevent completion of the program, even going so far as to impair the dignity of the republic and endanger its sovereignty by provoking a conflict with a neighboring republic, seeking to bring intervention on the pretext that there was no protection for lives and property of foreigners. They even pretended to seek intervention for humanitarian reasons.

SAYS MEXICAN TROUBLE STARTED IN AMERICA

Omaha, Sept. 15.—From his observation and conversations with army officers and others on the Mexican border, I am convinced that most of the trouble there originated on this side of the boundary, said Rev. John F. Poucher, pastor of the Fourth Nebraska church, who returned home last night on a 7:45 train. "The trouble is mostly over water and the treatment of Mexican laborers by land owners on the American side. The land was formerly Mexican territory and the Mexicans who have been forced off the land on which they have lived from time immemorial resent the treatment they receive. It is claimed Mexican laborers are treated little better than slaves and when they revolt are shot down without compunction."

ARMY OFFICERS SILENT ON POUCHER'S STATEMENT

San Antonio, Texas, Sept. 15.—Army officers today said they had no comment to make on the statement of Rev. John F. Poucher of Omaha that he was convinced the Mexican trouble originated on this side of the border.

It was indicated that possibly Rev. Poucher may be questioned regarding his statement if he returns to his duties as pastor of the Fourth Nebraska church, and when they revolt are shot down without compunction.

CHIHUAHUA BELIEVES THE CHIEF BANDIT NOW IS HEMMED IN BY A CORDON OF GOVERNMENT SOLDIERS AND CANNOT ESCAPE

Chihuahua, Mexico, Sept. 15.—The cordon of constitutionalist forces thrown around Villa and his band has at last come into contact with General Carranza, according to reports received today by General Trevino.

Chihuahua City is tonight celebrating the "GRITO" or fiesta on the eve of the Mexican independence day. In the parade here tomorrow ten to 15,000 Mexican soldiers will be marching.

ROOSEVELT ITINERARY IS NOW BEING PLANNED

New York, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—Plans for President Roosevelt's western campaign trip in support of Charles E. Hughes, alternative, are being considered. One of them would carry the president to San Francisco with speeches at Chicago, Denver and other speeches on the way. The other contemplates a tour to the middle states with a side trip into the northwest, and a return by the way of Missouri and Kentucky.

Fairbanks Has Gastritis. Chicago, Sept. 15.—Ward's weekly western republican campaign headquarters today that Charles W.
