He walked for two miles through an area which reverberated to the blasta of the great guns, picking his way between the bursts of flame from the crashing batteries and moving among the rows of cannon as one who seeks a ford in a stream. On the other side of the ridge he saw guns where he had never seen them before—on the rounded land of the lower levels which the British infantry who listened to their thunderous chorus as they prepared for the charge in today's attack.

ATTACKS BY AUSTRIANS REPELLED BY ITALIANS

LONDON IS PLEASED AT SUCCESSES OF ALLIES
London, Sept. 27 (2:47 a. m.)—The capture of Thiepval by the British and of Combes by the combined Anglo-French forces announced in the latest official communication, is regarded here as the most important success on the western front since the opening of the grand offensive.

But the capture of Thiepval, which was announced today, is of great importance because it has been a stumbling block in the advance of the British left almost since the beginning of the offensive. It is a check at Combes and was suffered. Thiepval's fall gives to the Anglo-French forces the whole line of low hills which slope to the plain upon which the town of Hamincourt makes the best fortified center.

The semi-official accounts of the capture of Combes speak of the large number of the mortars and the great quantity of warlike stores taken. Reuter's official correspondent says: "The great success was won at very small cost, thanks in part to the excellence of the artillery and in part to a real collapse of the German defense."

IRRIGATION NOW BIG PROBLEM FOR THE SOUTHWEST

IRRIGATION NOW BIG PROBLEM FOR THE SOUTHWEST
Governor Capper Gives Views on Important Question to Member of Board of Control of Congress.

EL PASO, Sept. 26.—One of the really big, worth-while jobs now confronting the people of the west and southwest, especially is the irrigation of the great semi-arid plains which comprise much of the territory for a hundred miles or more on either side of the Rocky mountain slope. In this section thousands of acres of valuable land are untilled and unproductive simply because, through some twist nature has denied, them sufficient moisture to enable them to bring forth the quantities, writes Governor Arthur Capper of Kansas to James J. McNary of the board of control of the irrigation congress, which meets here October 11 to 15, with opening session at the dedication of the Elephant Butte dam, October 14.

"I believe there are fine possibilities for wealth and progress in these new unutilized areas, since they are supplied with moisture and planted to crops. I am confident that a great agricultural and industrial awakening awaits only the development of an irrigation project which will encourage this section. The opportunity is there. Experiments more or less isolated and individual in character have demonstrated that semi-arid regions can be made to produce abundantly at almost all kinds of reasonable crops when properly irrigated."

"I am a firm believer in irrigation of our arid plains, a problem which is worthy of the very best attention of all our people. The people of Kansas are giving more and more attention to the subject of irrigation and there is a growing appreciation of its value. This state now maintains a department to study the best methods of irrigation, demonstrate the different methods available for our state and save our people the benefit of the experience gained. I am sure much good will come out of the work of this department."

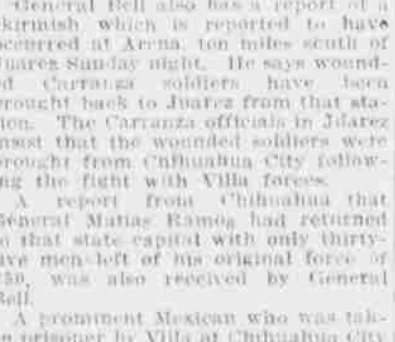
DEMOCRATS OF ILLINOIS HOLD STATE MEETING

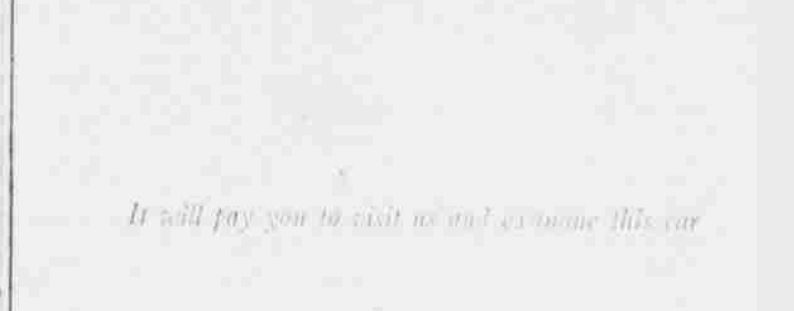
