The Right Rev. Edwin S. Lines, bishop of Newark, N. J., said: 'It is a great mistake to bind the fortunes of the church with the privileged classes.'

The Right Rev. W. A. Guerry, bishop of South Carolina, said the church has definitely and finally committed itself to the work of social reform.

Need a Religious Jim Hill. 'We need some Jim Hill in religious work,' he said. 'Jim Hill was the instrument by which some of our railroad leaders were raised to affluence. We need a few men like him in religious education work to raise 10,000 educational leaders to affluence.'

BELIEVES THAT SAME OLD CROWD RUNS THE G. O. P.

Henry T. Hunt, ex-Mayor of Cincinnati, Says It Is Surprising How Universal the Thought Is Over Country.

BY MORNING JOURNAL SPECIAL LEASED WIRE. New York, Oct. 20.—Henry T. Hunt, former mayor of Cincinnati, a veteran of red-hot Ohio political fights, and now secretary of the Wilson Business Men's National League at 250 Madison avenue, New York City, said today that the league was in touch through its branches with business men in practically every city and town in the United States and that it was astonishing how universal business men were convinced that the 'same old crowd' was running the republican party.

Knowledge Would Stun Republicans. 'If the republicans who cherish the idea that business men as a class are antagonistic to President Wilson had access to our correspondence from Illinois, Michigan, Ohio—the great middle west generally, indeed—they would be stunned. Men whose personal investments aggregate millions of dollars and whose responsibilities extend to every field of industry in these states have sent us hundreds of autograph letters asserting in most definite fashion that they do not trust the men back of Hughes. And many of them have been life-long republicans.'

Currency Law Strikes Business Men. Mr. Hunt was asked what seemed to strike the business men as the most important step taken by the administration in helping business.

Both Sides Sure of Victory on Election Day. 'The currency law,' he replied, 'coupled with President Wilson's conviction that tariff making is a scientific and not a political matter, they believe in the tariff commission, which is to hold the tariff in abeyance and industry under constant observation, with a view to correcting whatever inequalities may develop. They are reluctant to have business face the long-continued uncertainty of tariff-making in the Payne-Aldrich era.'

VILLARD FINDS DRIFT TOWARD THE PRESIDENT. SPECIAL DISPATCH TO MORNING JOURNAL. New York, Oct. 20.—A weekly Garrisson Villard, editor and owner of the New York Evening Post, which has not been supporting President Wilson, is making a personal tour up-state, in a dispatch to his newspaper tonight from Westport, N. Y., Mr. Villard reports an 'unmistakable and surprising drift in President Wilson which he says is strong.'

AMERICAN GREEKS TO ASSIST VENIZELOS. London, Oct. 20.—Additional estimates have been sent to Salonika, according to Reuters' correspondence, that a further strong contingent of infantry was landed today and that several detachments of Greek troops have arrived from Crete to join the national army.

OREGON CASE ON WOMEN WAGE LAW POSTPONED. Washington, Oct. 20.—The political campaign is somewhat disarranging the Oregon argument of cases before the supreme court of the United States. At the request of Oregon's attorney general the court today temporarily postponed reargument of the case testing the constitutionality of the Oregon minimum wage law for women the first of its kind to come before the supreme court.

PLUMBERS REVISE BY-LAWS. Washington, Oct. 20.—The department of justice has been advised that the directors of the National Association of Master Plumbers which has been under attack as in violation of the Sherman law, have passed a resolution by which the entire plan of operation and by-laws of the organization are to be revised to meet the government's criticism.

MOST STARTLING REVELATIONS BY MUESTERBERG

Harvard Professor Asserts Alliance Between Germany, Russia and Japan Is to Be Formed Soon.

BY MORNING JOURNAL SPECIAL LEASED WIRE. Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 20.—Hugo Muensterberg, professor of psychology at Harvard university, in an address tonight before the International Policy club of the university, asserted that he had been reliably informed that Russia and Germany would sign terms of a separate peace before spring, and that after this peace there would be an alliance between Germany, Russia and Japan.

'I know from reliable sources,' he said, 'that Russia is out of joint, is half-bankrupt, is starving, and will be ready for a separate peace before spring. The result is to be an alliance between Germany, Austria, Russia and Japan. Japan and Russia are pushing toward this combination and an overwhelming majority of the German people would welcome it today. It is the old Bismarckian tradition that Germany ought to be the friend of Russia and that such an alliance would be her surest protection.'

Call Tax Commission to Show Records. Denver, Oct. 20.—The state tax commission was today called upon in a resolution by the state board of equalization to present all its records pertaining to the valuations of property of every county and corporation in the state, upon which taxes were fixed.

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AMERICANS ARE RAPIDLY LEAVING THE PHILIPPINES

Man Who Served for Eleven Years in Bureau of Education, Says Employees Are Quitting Government.

BY MORNING JOURNAL SPECIAL LEASED WIRE. Mohonk Lake, N. Y., Oct. 20.—John L. Potter, who recently returned from the Philippines, here for eleven years he was chief clerk in the bureau of education, today declared before the Lake Mohonk Conference on Indians and Other Dependents—Peoples, that American employees in the islands are being forced out by democratic rule, of the resignation.

Governor General Harrison and Vice Governor Martin, he said, are sincerely carrying out orders from Washington, and Mr. Martin, at least, he added, is openly in favor of getting Americans out of the islands as soon and as completely as possible. The Philippine government, Mr. Potter declared, has passed a 'polite invitation' to get out by granting a year's salary to Americans who apply for withdrawal, an invitation that is being generally accepted because Americans, whether in government employ or in business, feel that if they are not to be allowed to remain permanently now is the time to leave.

RUSSIA TO BAR CERTAIN GOODS OF AMERICAN MAKE. Washington, Oct. 20.—Notice that Russia contemplates issuance of a decree temporarily prohibiting the importation of many articles, including some goods which figure in the American export trade, was given today in an announcement of the department of commerce.

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RUMANIANS GAIN GREAT VICTORY OVER INVADERS

Austro-Germans Are Hurling Back Through Passes of Mountains to Border, Says Bucharest Dispatch.
