

FAMILY DAZED BY SMOKE SAVED BY PATROLMAN

As Sleeping on Third Floor as Fire Is Discovered in Basement.

Patrolman Dominie F. Bligh of the West Thirtieth street station was on fixed post at Fifth avenue and Thirtieth street early this morning when he noticed smoke coming from the four-story converted dwelling house at No. 3 East Thirtieth street. The smoke was pouring from the upper windows. Bligh sped for assistance, and then burst in front door. The first floor was occupied by the stationery store of M. S. Sperry, the second floor by a dress-making concern, and the third floor by Mrs. Newman, who was asleep with her wife and three children—Lillian, ten years, May, six, and Elizabeth, seven months—and a domestic, Ida Over. Bligh broke open their door, and New-

man and his family, who were dazed by the smoke, came out. The policeman carried the three children down the stairs and to the street, and then went back to assist Newman, who was helping his wife and the servant to safety. On the street the party revived from the effects of the smoke, and did not need medical assistance.

Another policeman, hearing Bligh's raps for assistance, had come to the scene and sent in an alarm. The fire was in the basement among a pile of rubbish. It had caught the woodwork, and the smoke was heavy. The firemen put out the blaze at a trifling damage. The cause of the outbreak is not known.

Because he was ill and homesick for Ireland, Andrew MacDermott, thirty-three, a clerk in James Butler's grocery store, Westchester Village, committed suicide to-day by hanging himself to a bedpost by a handkerchief in his room in Kennedy's Hotel, No. 1477 Williams Bridge road.

MacDermott came from Ireland only a week ago, securing employment as a grocery clerk. After two days he began to complain of illness and expressed a desire to return. On several occasions he declared his intention of leaving the price of his passage as quickly as he could. Last night, when he reached the hotel, he spoke regretfully of his coming to this country.
