

New York's Representatives in National and American Leagues Led Rivals in High Score Games Last Season

CLOSER GAMES IN NATIONAL LEAGUE

Senior Circuit Had Far Fewer High Score Contests Than American.

LOW TALLIES FOR YANKS

The high score games in the two major leagues last season furnish some interesting fuel for the Hot Stove League.

Had the National League possessed such a football to boot around as the baseballs in the American League.

There were forty-four games in the American League in which the winning club pounded out ten runs or more.

The Yankees collected the greatest number of runs in one afternoon when they exploded their dynamite under the Cleveland Indians.

The worst season came on July 25 when the White Sox beat them 13 to 8. Though the Yankees held their own with Chicago on the season's play, when the White Sox spanked them they made a thorough job of it.

The pitchers of the world's champion Red Sox proved their worth inasmuch as they figured in the losing end of only two of the forty-four American League games in which ten or more runs were scored.

The thumpers on Cleveland and Detroit heaped the most humiliation upon American League pitchers. There were eleven games in which the Indians rolled up ten runs or more, while the Tigers won nine such contests.

A Philadelphia Carnival. Runs were cheaper in Philadelphia on August 25 than at any other time during the season.

The weakness of the Giants last season with the exception of their May and September spurts, was generally believed to be the pitching staff.

There was only one other big league team which evaded high score defeats as skillfully as the Giants. That was Philadelphia.

The Giants put over more high score victories than any other National League team.

It is interesting to note, however, that during the September run of twenty-six straight victories there was not a single game in which New York scored as many as ten runs.

As the Yankees piled up the biggest score in the American League, the two National League members of greater note for the honor of having made the biggest score during the year in the National League.

Brooklyn won the championship of the American Association in 1889 and the National League championships in 1890, 1891, 1892 and 1893.

Chicago won the world series (ten); Boston the most pennants (ten).
