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COUNCILMEN TRAPPED IN BIG GRAFT EXPOSURE OF \$1,000,000 DEAL

Atlantic City Shaken by Revelations Involving Nine of Its Officials. CAUGHT LIKE ABE REUFF Same Method of Bribery Used as Ensnared the San Francisco Boss.

(Special to The Evening World.) ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 31.—The most sensational graft exposure in the history of the city, involving Councilman Samuel Phoebe, Gus Keasler, William Maize, James Lane, Harry Dougherty and four others whose names are not disclosed, "broke" to-day when it became known that William J. Burns, the famous detective, using the same methods as he employed in the Ohio Legislature and to land Abe Reuff in San Francisco, had trapped four into a confession and called together for a further hearing on the charges of accepting graft for their support in securing the passage of the "conscience boardwalk bill," a million dollar operation openly branded as a steal, at the time it was introduced during January. More arrests are expected at any hour to-day. It is said the revelations in connection with the case will lead to other things of more sensational nature. Edmund C. Wilson, State Attorney General, will this afternoon join Detective Burns, who arrived at the Marlborough-Blenheim yesterday, when Dougherty, the only one of the quintet to hold his nerve when confronted with stenographic records of the conversation which took place when it is alleged he with the others accepted a \$500 bribe, "a retainer," to push the deal, will be arraigned before Magistrate Burgen of Hamilton, at 3 o'clock. Dougherty, who laughed in Burns's face, refused to make a signed confession, as the others had done, and told the sleuth to "go as far as he liked."

This report is stirred as it has never been before by the testimony adduced before the famous Mackey Probing Commission, which unearthed ballot box tampering of the most sordid character here during 1911, leading to the conviction and incarceration of "Boss" Louis Kaufman, the appointment of the hard-working Elmer Grand Jury, which turned the report inside out as it dragged politician after politician from the quagmire of graft, conspiracy, vote-buying and general thuggery. The councilmen say they were "working it alone." Everybody is discussing the affair.

MEN INVOLVED TO HAND IN RESIGNATIONS.

Every man involved has promised to hand in his resignation to-day. While four have admitted their guilt, according to Detective Burns, they have not yet been arrested. They have handed over the \$500 to the operative and

JOY RIDING AUTO KILLS ONE, TWO MORE WILL DIE

A joy-riding chauffeur, James Hall, only a few days ago in the employ of Archibald A. Hutchinson, a lawyer, who lives in the Hotel Roland, on East Fifty-ninth street, took his employer's big new touring car out without permission yesterday afternoon, jammed it with nine young men and two young women and drove them to disaster at Forest Hill, L. I., early to-day, killing one passenger, mortally injuring two and injuring all the others save himself. Immediately after his heavily laden car had turned over and strewn the human freight in every direction the chauffeur fled and has not yet been located.

John Eagan, twenty-one years old, No. 244 Mount Hope Place, Bronx, was killed outright. Frank Larkin, twenty-five, of No. 223 West Forty-ninth street, and William McNulty, twenty, of No. 232 East Thirty-second street, were mortally hurt and are dying in the Minoa Hospital. Martin Kermochan and Hazel Smith, both cigarette makers, the only women passengers, escaped with a few bruises. All of the other men passengers, save the chauffeur, were more or less hurt and were taken to the hospital in automobiles to be ministered to.

The tragedy occurred on the Hoffman Boulevard near the White Point road, Forest Hills, while Hall was driving his car at full speed. Siewing into a gully that had been caused by the heavy rainfall yesterday he turned suddenly, flinging the overloaded car so sharply that it turned over.

CARPATHIA HEROES TAXI-WRECKED ON DASH TO LUNCHEON

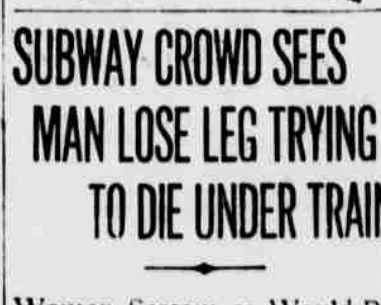

Mrs. John B. Thayer of Haverford, Pa., whose husband, like Mrs. Astor's, lost his life in the disaster, had already arrived; she was to be the only other guest. The Carpathia's officers apparently were in fear of being late. They had urged the driver of their taxicab, William Rowan, to his highest speed. He went up Fifth avenue at a terrific pace, darting around other vehicles in a way that made onlookers stop and gasp. As the cab grazed the radiator of a big green motor omnibus a forward tire came off and flew to the sidewalk, just missing two children, who were being led toward the park by a governess.

Roosevelt to Run, But Cannot Win, Bryan's Forecast

THREATEN STRIKES IN EVERY HOTEL SOUTH OF 59TH ST. TO-NIGHT

Walters Walk Out at Sherry's and Restaurant Closed Till Trouble Is Over—New Vanderbilt Hotel Joins List.

STRIKERS TOTAL 2,755; HOTEL LOOKS FOR JAPS
College Boys Rush to Get Jobs at Another Hostelry—Managers Prepare for Siege.

The strike of the hotel waiters and cooks gained many recruits to-day and the union leaders threaten to call strikes in every hotel of importance south of Fifty-ninth street at the dinner hour this evening. Waiters or cooks or both are now on strike in eighteen leading hotels, two clubs and a big restaurant. The strikers number 2,755.

Encouraged by the apparent widespread growth of the strike movement, the union leaders plan to broaden the scope of their work. They say the trouble is just beginning and that it will be hard to get anything to eat in a New York hotel unless the hotel owners agree to recognize the union.
