No Known Professional Betto: Admitted to Highlanders' Game To-Day.

Officials of the New York America League Club placed private detectives at all entrances to the Polo Grounds this afternoon to bar professional base ball gamblers from entering the grounds. The ejection of a large number of gamblers from the grounds in Philadelphia and this city yesterday was the first move in a campaign of extermination, according to the diamond magnates.

Secretary Tom Davis of the Highander Club declared to-day that all attempts to open betting at the Pole Grounds while his team was playing would be quickly suppressed.

"This club won't permit of gambling at its grounds for a minute," said the secretary. "Our action yesterday was only the first move to rid the game in this city of the obnoxious betting features. We don't intend to have the diamond game subjected to the same trouble the race tracks had. The Polo Grounds police force will be on the aiert to bar out gamblers, and we do not care whether they come from Boston, New Jersey or New York, The will not be given an opportunity to ply their trade here, and that's final."
