2,500 PRIZE BABIES PARADE IN HARLEM, GIRLS BEAT BOYS

Wonderfully Decorated Floats and Cabs Vie for Honors With Pretty Toddlers.

Many happy mothers are holding up their babies to-day in Harlem and telling the cooies-tooties that they are winners. And they are. For yesterday was Baby Day in Harlem. All the world knows that Harlem is holding a carnival. They have had automobile parades, industrial shows and all kinds of turnouts during the week, and yesterday the great district across the river was given up to its youngest residents.

The little ones were the whole thing in Harlem while their parade was on. They stopped the cars and kept busy Police Inspector Thomas Ryan and 400 of his men. Oh, yes, it was some parade. And if they were giving out prizes for best looking mothers—well, there wouldn't have been a sea around to go around.

From the east side and the west side troop of toddlers. From four sections of Harlem the line was formed. One group was composed of the kiddies living on Third avenue and east of Third avenue between One Hundred and Sixteenth and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets. The second division comprised the baby boys and girls of the Bronx and Harlem between Third avenue and Fifth avenue. The third section came from Fifth avenue and west to Seventh avenue and north from One Hundred and Tenth street. The fourth was made up of the youngsters of Seventh avenue and west of that thoroughfare.

The line formed at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Lenox avenue and went down the latter to One Hundred and Sixteenth street, thence to Madison avenue and north to Mount Morris Park, where the

prize winners were hailed and the prizes awarded. Not less than 2,500 babies were in the procession, and the good people of Harlem gave them 140 prizes.

All the toddlers were accompanied by their mothers, their sisters and their aunts, sometimes father showed up, but the masculine gender was generally among the missing. And the girls were the prettiest. And as the prize awarders were women, this must have been right.

But it was a sight that Harlem seldom has seen. There were more babies on the sidewalks than in the parade. The streets were littered with baby carriages and thousands of "little bright eyes" were out on promenade with mother or nurse. They cooed to the kiddies on parade as they passed. Some of the paraders went afoot, but most of them rode in rigs.

And here's where the art of mother came in for full play. Some of the most wonderful designs had been woven into and about the buggies that bore the babies. There were floats and there was enough variety to tax the genius of the world's designers. Ordinary carriages there were wreathed with flowers, with roses, yellow and pink and red and white. The carriages had been transformed into aeroplanes and automobiles with cute little angels for the chauffeurs. Doves there were in plenty riding on baby's automobile and aeroplane and cart. The messages sent out by Harlem's babies was one of peace.

Little May Rogers sat back in her carriage of white and green trimmings and her way was marked by a white dove. In the bill of the dove was a great golden ring and a marriage bell hung above her tiny head. Beneath the ring was the inscription: "Fruit of the Wedding." May won the third prize.

Margaret Devery, a pink confection in a cupid-topped canoe of pink flowers, won the first prize. John and Margaret Devery of No. 246 East One Hundred and Nineteenth street are her proud parents. The second prize was awarded to Ellenor O'Connor. She is only eighteen months old and her mother is Mrs. Josephine O'Connor of No. 214 East One Hundred and Nineteenth street.

Marion Louise Drechsler, eight months old, whose mother is Mrs. Margaret Drechsler of No. 237 Second avenue, won fourth prize. She's the prize baby of the milk station and weighs twenty-three pounds. She weighed six and three-quarter pounds at her birth. Helen Cameron was awarded fifth prize. Her mother is Mrs. Helen Cameron of No. 267 East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street. Mildred Broughton, two years old, came next. Her parents are John and Katherine the famous No. 243 East One Hundred and Twenty-third street.

The first boy to win a prize was Robert Carvella, fourteen months old. His mother is Mrs. Carvella and lives at No. 247 East One Hundred and Fifteenth street. Robert Conklin, son of Sophie Conklin of No. 226 East One Hundred and Twenty-first street, was next, and Irving Werner, whose mother is Catherine Werner of No. 212 East One Hundred and Twenty-second street, again helped the boys' column. Katherine the famous was the tenth winner. She bears the same name as her mother and lives at No. 217 Third avenue. There were just 130 other prize winners.
