

MORE GOLD GOING ABROAD.

In All \$2,500,000 Leaves on To-Morrow's Steamers.

Little Effect on the Stock Market, Which is Dull but Strong.

The export movement of gold continues to attract attention in financial circles, but has little effect upon the markets for securities, partly for the reason that bankers generally look for a cessation of shipments before long and partly because of the extraordinary ease in money.

The balance of trade being so largely in our favor, the chances are that before the end of the year the return flow of the yellow metal will be larger than the present outflow.

Additional shipments for to-morrow include: Barling, Macoun & Co., \$500,000; Kessler & Co., \$100,000; Zimmermann & Porschay, \$100,000; Hosker, Wood & Co., \$250,000; Kidder, Peabody & Co., of Boston, \$500,000.

Lazard Freres announce they will not ship the \$100,000 francs consigned to them to Cuba to-morrow.

The steamer Trave, which arrived last night, brought 1,575,000 francs consigned to Hosker, Wood & Co. and \$50,000 francs to Heidelberg, Ickelheimer & Co.

The prospect of speedy action by Congress on the tariff had an influence on the stock market this morning. The leading stocks, of course, were profitable, but the undertone of speculation was strong, and the bulls were in control.

American Sugar rose 7 1/2 to 108 3/4; do. Ref., 12 to 97 1/2; Burlington & Quincy, 1 1/4 to 1 1/4; Distillers, 1 1/4 to 25 1/4; Michigan Pacific, 3 1/4 to 39 3/4; Lead, 1 1/4 to 1 1/4; Chicago Gas, 3 1/4 to 14 1/4; Union Pacific, 3 1/4 to 18 3/4; Atchison, 3 1/4 to 12 3/4; St. Paul, 1 1/2 to 12 1/8; and North Pacific, 1 1/2 to 12 1/8.

Money remains easy at 1 per cent. on call and foreign exchange firm at 47 1/2 for bankers' sixty-day bills, and 48 1/2 for demand.

In London bar silver declined to 291 per ounce. Commercial bar here fell to \$1.34, and Mexican dollars to \$1.14.

Stocks were in the main strong, and still higher quotations were recorded. The special features were Chicago Gas, Lead, Sugar and the Grangers.

The volume of business was quite moderate so far as the general market was concerned, and at intervals speculation was positively dull. A fair demand prevailed, and Lead commanded a premium and New York Central and Louisville 1-12.

CAN DRINK IN 8,986 PLACES.

Excise Board Reports That Number Are Licensed.
