ALL KINGS MUST STICK TOGETHER, CHARLES WROTE

Austrian Emperor's Secret Letter Won Roumanian Ruler From Allies' Side.

LONDON, May 31 (Correspondence of Associated Press).—A private and secret letter written to King Ferdinand of Roumania by Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary in the latter part of February, marked the turning point in Roumania's participation in the world war and was one of the deciding factors in the long series of intrigues which eventually broke the spirit of the Roumanian King. Under this outside pressure King Ferdinand changed from an ardent supporter of the war against Germany into a lukewarm and vacillating opportunist and finally into a distinct peace advocate.

"This is a time when Kings must stick together."
"This is the most striking sentence of the letter of Emperor Charles, a summary of its contents was communicated to the American Minister and to the Associated Press correspondent in Jassy by a high official, who is one of the most steadfast friends of the Allies at the Roumanian Court.

In intimate tones the Austrian Emperor directed the attention of King Ferdinand to the great danger for all monarchial institutions from the wave of Socialism which was sweeping Eastern Europe. He drew a heart-felt picture of the danger to Austria from the spread of Bolshevism across the Russian border and declared the Roumanian dynasty was in equal danger from the same source.

Emperor Charles pleaded with the Roumanian King to join with other monarchies in Europe in the death struggle with democracy, and promised that if Ferdinand would abandon the Allies, Germany and Austria would support him in retaining his throne. After portraying Roumania as abandoned by the Allies and helpless before the powerful Central Powers, Emperor Charles closed his letter with the sentence quoted above.

King Ferdinand's letter to Alexander Marghiloman, the Roumanian Premier, thanking him for the conclusion of peace, marked the final step in the King's surrender to the dogma of Emperor Charles that Kings must stick together.

The earlier attitude of King Ferdinand toward the war offers a striking contrast to the subservient tone of his letter this month to Premier Marghiloman. As late as mid-February the King expressed to the Associated Press correspondent, a desire that an interview or a statement showing his loyal adherence to the alliance with the Entente should be published in the United States.

An audience was arranged and the King insisted on speaking English, although he is not a complete master of English, because, he said, he was anxious to make his position absolutely clear to the American people and thought that it could be done better in plain English than through a translation from the French or Roumanian. Unfortunately, the interview was started to the United States by way of Olessa. A strike of Bolshevik telegraph operators there prevented it from going any farther.

On the subject of peace proposals by the Central Powers, which was then the all-important subject in Jassy, the King, in the interview, declared:
"It would be unthinkable for Roumania to accept peace without the consent of her Allies. For Roumania to make such a peace would be an act of dishonor."

ELLIOTT AND UNDERWOOD OUT AS RAILROAD CHIEFS

Removed as Operating Officers of New Haven and Erie, but Still Head Companies.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Howard Elliott of the New Haven and F. D. Underwood of the Erie are among the railroad executives removed today as chief operating officers of their roads by appointment of Federal managers to operate lines for the Railroad Administration. Both will remain heads of their respective companies, however, and their salaries will be paid out of corporate funds rather than from operating receipts accruing to the Government.

WILL ORDERS DOG'S DEATH.

Cornelia Rose Instructed Executor to Chloroform Her Pet.
"I direct my executor to cause my little dog Daisy to be chloroformed after my death."
This clause in the will of Cornelia

Rose, who died May 20 at her home, No. 105 West 191st Street, closes a friendship between dog and mistress which had lasted all "little Daisy's" life. The will also provided that her own body should be cremated, "and the ashes scattered to the winds."
The estate of Miss Rose, which amounts to about \$5,000, is to be divided among sixteen relatives and the Montefiore Home for the Aged, which is made the residuary legatee.

THEODORE P. SHONTS ILL, IS HOSPITAL PATIENT

"Very Sick Man" Is Report, "but Resting Comfortably"—Under Treatment Some Time.

President Theodore P. Shonts of the Interborough Rapid Transit is in the Post-Graduate Hospital "a very sick man," but early to-day was reported resting comfortably. The hospital authorities declined to tell the nature of his ailment.
For some time Mr. Shonts has not been in good health. A few days ago he went to his summer home at Long Branch, but last Friday returned to his apartment at the Plaza Hotel, where he was under the constant care of his personal physician, Dr. Samuel Lambert of No. 135 West 34th Street. Yesterday late he was removed to the hospital.

WANTED: OWNERS OF GEMS SAID TO BE WORTH \$3,500

Police Have Had Lost Bracelet and Lavalliere, Set With Diamonds, Nearly a Month.

Lieut. Thompson, in charge of the Lost Property Bureau at Police Headquarters, is anxious to find the owners of two valuable pieces of jewelry which have been held nearly a month. They are a gold and platinum bracelet of the flexible extension variety, and a gold and platinum lavalliere. The former, apparently made in France, has twenty-seven diamonds and its estimated value is \$2,500. The lavalliere has sixteen diamonds and is valued at \$1,500.
The bracelet was found May 20 on 43d Street, near the Public Library, by a boy who tried to dispose of it at second hand jewelry store. The lavalliere was found by Miss Schultz, an employee of I. Geiler, on the floor of his store, No. 28 West 114th Street, on May 16.

Gentle Recovering From Damage by Earthquake.

GUATEMALA, June 11.—The American Red Cross Relief Commission, which came here after the earthquake disaster of last December, has closed its activities and will return to New Orleans by the next steamer.
