

FLAGLER IS SUED FOR \$75,000 OVER MEMORIAL TO WIFE

Founder of "Society of Justice, Inc.," Says Financier Promised to Aid.

On the calendar in Justice Mullan's part of the Supreme Court to-day there is marked ready the \$75,000 damage suit of George B. Bender against John H. Flagler, financier.

Recently Bender served on Mr. Flagler's attorneys a bill of particulars in which he alleges he met the millionaire Feb. 28, 1919. Bender alleges he told Flagler he had just finished a term in prison for a crime of which he was innocent and that he was almost blind as a result of his experience while serving his term. He said he had found that approximately 5 per cent. of the men imprisoned were innocent. Bender then suggested the organization of a Society of Justice, Inc., in memory of Mr. Flagler's dead wife, who had taken a prominent part in welfare work.

Mr. Flagler, according to Bender, was enthusiastic. On March 5, 1919, Bender says, he called on Mr. Flagler and showed him stationery informing the public that the society was organized in the memory of "Alice Mandelick Flagler (one who loves justice)." Bender alleges Mr. Flagler said he would recompense him for his work and that he would provide a foundation for the support of the society.

Bender says he called on a number of prominent persons and explained to them the purpose of the organization. Some of those he interviewed were George Gordon Battle, "a Mr. Leyth of Wall Street," Blaine Dawson, Edwin S. Merrill, Thomas F. Fallon Jr., B. Ogden Chisholm, Alfred T. Tallafero and Mrs. Loretta Chisholm. Mrs. Caruthers, Bender alleges, interested Mrs. Ella O'Gorman Stanton, sister of former United States Senator James A. O'Gorman. Bender says that he devoted seven hours a day for five months to the work. In Mr. Flagler's answer, filed by

Hays & Wadhams, No. 41 Exchange Place, he says the society was incorporated in July, 1919, and that he paid Bender \$25 a week for six months, following which he was discharged. Mr. Flagler then told Bender, he says, that he had done all he intended doing for the organization. He denied that Bender organized the society at his solicitation. When the case was called to-day Justice Mullan put it over until next Thursday.

FLAMES IMPERIL BARREN ISLAND

Children Removed to Safety as Inhabitants Battle with Stubborn Blaze.

A spectacular fire early to-day destroyed a two-story wooden building on Barren Island and threatened for a time to spread to oil tanks nearby. The blaze started in one of the five buildings of the New York Sanitary Utilization Company.

Antonio Dublasi, the watchman, gave the alarm and the eighty inhabitants of the island formed a bucket brigade to fight the flames until the fireboat William J. Gaynor arrived. The eight frame houses, in which most of the inhabitants live, were in such danger that all persons who did not stay to fight the fire retired to the other end of the island with the children.

It was at first reported that a

Shipping Board freighter had taken fire and three others were endangered, but this was denied by Capt. O. O. W. Parker, Superintendent of the Marine Department here. The fire did \$25,000 damage.

FOUR CHILDREN KILLED BY AUTOS

Du Pont Official Runs Down Boy Cyclist and Is Arrested—Other Drivers Held.

During a dispute between several in front of his home last night, eight-year-old Joseph Marlowe, of No. 1575 110e Avenue, Bronx, is alleged to have been pushed into the street just as an automobile, driven by Nathan Rosman, of No. 745 East 175th Street, came along. The machine struck the child, throwing him against the curb and fracturing his skull. He died twenty minutes later. Rosman was arrested.

An automobile driven by F. L. Connable, a Vice President of the E. J. Du Pont de Nemours Company, collided near Sea Bright, N. J., yesterday afternoon, with a bicycle ridden by fourteen-year-old Joseph Porter. The boy suffered a fractured skull and died almost instantly. Mr. Connable was arrested.

Helen Dolan, seven, was killed by an automobile in front of her home at No. 725 Leonard Street, Brooklyn, last night. The car was driven by Frank Carpenter, of No. 299 49th Street, Corona, who was charged with manslaughter.

Thomas Corcoran, eleven, was killed by Harry Solow, of No. 1619 53d Street, Brooklyn. Solow was temporarily detained at Clymer Street Police Station

Bishop Laurie on Way to Warsaw—Minister Long on Essequibo.
