

### SAYS MRS. RAIZEN PLANNED KILLING WHILE IN FLORIDA

#### Testimony Taken by Commission Down South, Filed in Brooklyn To-Day.

Mrs. Lillian Raizen, confessed slayer of Dr. Abraham Glickstein, planned the slaying in Florida after she had gone there in an effort to rid herself of Glickstein's alleged influence over her, according to testimony given by Albert J. Richardson, one of the proprietors of the Seminole and the Royal Palms Hotels, Jacksonville, Fla., before a commission sent from Brooklyn to take the testimony of various Florida witnesses.

Assistant District Attorney Joseph V. Gallagher and Abraham Kesselman, counsel for Mrs. Raizen, were the commission. They took the testimony three weeks ago and their records were filed in County Court, Brooklyn, today.

Mrs. Raizen was in Florida in November, 1921, just prior to the murder of Dr. Glickstein. She was living at the Royal Palms and went to the Seminole to talk to Richardson.

"She asked me if a woman could buy a pistol in Florida," said Richardson. "I told her I did not know. After she had gotten some information at the desk, she came back to my desk and told me that she had gotten the information she wanted and that she would leave Jacksonville Tuesday morning and get into Savannah in the afternoon and would reach New York on Friday, and would kill him on Saturday, and Sunday it came out in the paper."

"But she told me that she had gotten a pistol while she was standing there. She stood there and talked with me until I went off watch, and I walked home with her. She opened up the pocket-book and showed me the pistol. She told me what she was going to do; that she was going to walk in his office, and she took this thing out of her handbag and pushed it up against me like that, and said, 'I am going to stick it up against him and kill him.'"

Among the witnesses examined were Miss Alice J. Richardson, Mrs. Selma J. Andrews and Mrs. Mary E. Robb, all stopping at the Royal Palms. They all expressed the belief that Mrs. Raizen's talk and actions indicated she was irrational, at least so far as Dr. Glickstein was concerned.

Four alienists have declared Mrs. Raizen insane, but two others have given it as their belief that she is sane. It was because of this conflict that County Judge Martin appointed the commission to take the testimony of the Florida witnesses.

It is expected Judge Martin will set an early date for a public hearing, at which he will formally decide whether Mrs. Raizen is sane and must be tried for the killing, or that she is insane and must be sent to the asylum for the criminal insane at Matteawan.

### SIXTY YEARS MARRIED, LUDWIGS TO CELEBRATE

Married three score years ago by Pastor Schramm in Manhattan, both are in excellent health and well preserved, but no festivities will mark the celebration due to the serious illness of a son-in-law.

Ludwig came to this country in 1854 from Weimar, Saxony, Germany, on a sailing vessel that took 85 days to cross the ocean. He was apprenticed to learn the trade of silversmith, and later established himself in Brooklyn, where he was successful. He retired from active business twenty-six years ago. His wife, nee Straub, was born in Ontario, Canada.

Three of the five children that blessed the union are still alive—Mrs. Eugene Dillinger, Mrs. Emma Duval and Wally Ludwig.

In his younger days Mr. Ludwig was a pioneer in the New York Turn Verein, a charter member of the Hoboken Turn Verein, an active member of the St. Maennerchor of Philadelphia and forty years a member of Pottsgorus Lodge, No. 56, F. & A. M.

### JEST STARTS ROW THAT ENDS WITH SHOOTING OF MAN

#### Crowd Watching Funeral Sees Young Husband Seriously Wounded.

Hundreds of people were lined on the sidewalk at Second Avenue at 106th Street watching a funeral procession pass through that section this morning, when Dominick Vigniano, twenty-four, No. 2055 Second Avenue, came out of his home and started to his work as a longshoreman.

Four men stepped from the crowd and stopped Vigniano. Persons on the sidewalk heard heated words pass between them. Suddenly one of the four drew a pistol and fired twice at Vigniano. He fell with bullet wounds in his neck and back. The men ran. People carried Vigniano into a shop. He was taken a few minutes later, in a serious condition, to Reception Hospital. Meanwhile someone had telephoned the police and reserves under Capt. Looman and Detective Ryan came in automobiles. They found the neighborhood quiet when they arrived, but learned, they said, the name of Vigniano's assailant.

The shooting, the police said, grew out of an argument and fight last night when Vigniano is reported to have beaten a man who twitted him about not being a father since he married two years ago.
