

MADISON AVE. FIGHT REOPENED BY ASTOR

He Charges His Property Has Been Depreciated for J. P. Morgan's Benefit.

WANTS BUSINESS BLOCK

Restriction to Residential Class Means \$1,000,000 Loss, He Asserts.

William Waldorf Astor, through his American attorney, Charles A. Peabody, has presented a petition to the Hyman Board of Estimate which will reopen the controversy whether his property on the westerly side of Madison avenue, between Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, shall be restricted to residential purposes under the zoning resolution.

It is charged that the Mitchell board in placing the property in the residential class had thereby lessened its value by \$1,000,000 to the benefit of the property on the other side of Madison avenue owned by J. P. Morgan and members of his family.
