

LOYALISTS GARRY WISCONSIN POINT Gov. Philipp Compelled to Call Special Election to Fill Senate Seat.

EVERY PARTY AROUSED Papers Insist That Man of Troved Americanism Be Selected.

Special Dispatch to The Sun. MADISON, Wis., Feb. 24.—Wisconsin Loyalists have won the first round in the fight to purge the State of disloyalty and to elect a 100 per cent. American to the United States Senate in succession to the late Paul O. Hastings. Victory came to the Loyalists last week when Gov. Philipp announced that he had called a special election for April 2.

Some Editorial Views.

Some of these editorial views follow: Superior Telegram (Rep.). "It seems like the part of the two leading political parties get together and agree on one candidate and give him such overwhelming support in the State that Wisconsin is not in peril."

Kenosha News (Rep.). "Gov. Philipp will insist that most of the rest of the State is wrong and that the only way for Wisconsin to get a Senator is to let him have legislative approval for his own appointment. He will undoubtedly find out that in following out this line he has alienated a lot of the strongest supporters. The time has passed when the Governor is the dictator of the State."

Must Talk for People. "The Governor has refused to call the election as provided for in the Constitution of the United States. It now becomes the duty of the Legislature to speak for the people of the State. Let our representatives in the Senate and the Assembly stand by the people."

New Richmond News (Rep.). "This is the time when the big issue, the main issue, the only real issue before the people of Wisconsin to-day, could be brought up and decided on its merits without entanglement with other matters of less importance."

Interviews with Republican leaders throughout the State also were printed in the endeavor to bring the Legislature and the people to the point of calling the special election. Democrats also joined in aiding the movement. Joseph Martin, the national Democratic committee man of Green Bay, issuing a statement virtually pledging his party to fusion at the polls. He also replied to a charge by Gov. Philipp that the Democrats had been organized to attempt to destroy the Republican party. Mr. Martin challenged the Governor to produce his proof and charges that Mr. Philipp's statement is as novel as it is untrue, and added: "The Governor knows that nearly all, if not all, the Democratic members of the Legislature will vote against giving him the power to appoint a United States senator," said Mr. Martin. "He fully realizes that he has lost his grip on the Republican leadership in our State."

The Democratic leaders in our State are not now thinking of acting in the terms of the party. We put our country above our party and we favor any movement which would maintain the election of loyal representatives and public officials, whether they be Democrats or Republicans. The Democratic State central committee has passed resolutions recommending legislative action to make possible a union of the different political parties for the period of the war, to the end that only loyal candidates be elected to the office of Governor and Senator. Mr. Martin then attacks the Governor for his failure to call the special election and to embody in his legislative act provision for the fusion of the two parties, and continues: "The Governor did assure the committee of the Wisconsin Loyalists that he would call the special election and that he would call the special election as provided for in the Constitution of the United States. It now becomes the duty of the Legislature to speak for the people of the State. Let our representatives in the Senate and the Assembly stand by the people."

Philipp has assumed, it is clearly evident that he does not recognize the present situation as to laws, Loyalists (Republican), Linn, and Burquist (Republican), Minnesota, who say that we should eliminate the words Republican and Democrat during the crisis in the nation."

MILWAUKEE PUPILS DROPPING GERMAN French and Spanish Taking Its Place in Grammar and High Schools.

Special Dispatch to The Sun. MILWAUKEE, Feb. 24.—The language of the Kaiser and "Kultur" has lost its popularity in the grammar schools of Milwaukee and in the high schools. French and Spanish are taking its place. After the declaration of war with Germany by the United States a movement was started here to make German an elective subject, giving the parents of the children in the grammar courses an opportunity to decide if they wished their offspring to study German. A compilation of the figures just completed show that there has been a decrease of 50 per cent. in the study of German in the grammar schools since the close of the school year in June, 1917. With the dropping of German in the B grades enrollment decreased to 23,309, approximately 50 per cent. Another drop of 30 per cent. was found in the enrollment for the present semester, bringing the total decrease since last June to 50 per cent. In the departmentalized grade schools of the city a marked decrease in the study of German also is shown in the figures compiled by M. C. Potter, superintendent of schools. At the beginning of the present semester there were 4,252 school children eligible for German and 2,407 enrolled. Last September, at the beginning of the fall term, 3,219 were taking German, the two terms showing a difference of 812 "kultur" students. In the high schools of the city German no longer is the popular study and French and Spanish are being elected. Of the 100 pupils in German between the September and February semesters, at present only 28 pupils are taking German in these schools, and last fall the number was 425. When the September term opened 152 were studying French, but when the February semester started 216 enrolled for French. The gain in Spanish from the September to the February semester is from 216 to 271.

30,000 WOMEN ON LIST TO VOTE MAR. 5 Will Cast Their First Ballots Here at Special Congress Elections.

FULL RETURNS COMPILED About 7,000 Men Also Are Registered as New Voters in Four Districts.

Complete figures on the special registration of women and newly qualified male voters in the four Congress districts where special elections are to be held March 5 to fill vacancies caused by resignations, indicate that more than 30,000 women intend to cast their first ballots on that date. Comparison of the figures filed in Friday and Saturday with those of the male registrants last fall is rendered impracticable by the fact that Assembly and Congress district lines have been shifted by legislative reapportionment since the last election. It was 45 when the soldier and sailor vote was counted. The soldiers' vote taken in Great Britain has all been allocated to the various constituencies and a staff of sixty officers commenced to count it yesterday. It is expected it will be completed by Wednesday, when the Government's majority will be further increased. TO REPORT BILL FOR PARTY CONVENTION Legislative Committee Will Recommend Return to Old System.

DRY FEATURE INJECTED Anti-Saloon League Opposes Repeal of Direct Primary Law.

Special Dispatch to The Sun. ALBANY, Feb. 24.—The wheels of the law making machine are expected to move fast this week. The 1918 session of the Legislature has so far been marked by negative or at least indifferent results, but the stage is now all set for producing the climax in the annual show of the solons at Albany. Practically all the big questions that are to be disposed of at this session are scheduled to be thrashed out this week and they are questions that will have a direct bearing on the political future and third term aspirations of Gov. Whitman. The committee appointed by Lieut.-Gov. Schoenck to investigate the direct primary law will meet to-morrow afternoon and will report favorably to the Senate. The committee will also recommend the party nominating convention. A hearing on this measure will be set for March 12. The committee is overwhelmingly in favor of the restoration of the State convention, and it is an open secret that the opponents of the governor as a third term candidate believe that their chances of beating him are better with the convention than with a continuance of the direct primary. It is not believed that a State convention bill can be passed over the governor's veto.

Anti-Liquor Campaign.

The State convention issue has been injected into the anti-liquor campaign, which is also to have its field day this week. On Tuesday the League will give on the measure for the ratification of the Federal prohibition amendment, and the dry advocates will be here in force to present their arguments. One of their principal speakers will be William Jennings Bryan, who is now on his way to Albany. William H. Anderson, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, on the eve of this hearing announced that the league is opposed to the repeal of the direct primary law. "The obvious purpose is to defeat Gov. Whitman and give the old Guard a desire the defeat of Gov. Whitman because of the prohibition issue." Mr. Anderson challenges Senator Brown to support the ratification of the Federal amendment and to announce that he will support the repeal of the direct primary law. \$50,000 THEFTS LAID TO WINDOW WASHERS Three Men Arrested in Upper West Side Robberies.

Two men were arrested yesterday charged with thefts which, it is said, will aggregate \$50,000 and which they are alleged to have committed in apartments of the upper West Side while purporting to wash windows. The men are Charles Daniels of East Tenth street and Onnie Manoukin of East Thirty-first street. Serpe Kayyan, who conducts a jewelry store at 245 Second avenue, was arrested at the same time charged with receiving stolen property. According to the police Kayyan has been buying a great amount of jewelry from the two men recently, and his reports from well to do apartment dwellers in regard to lost valuables, in almost every case the men, it is said, left behind their operating and scrubbing apparatus. The method was to solicit work from persons known to have valuables. When one man washed the other would maneuver about unguarded rooms in an apartment. After the latter got out the jewelry he could find the two would get together for lunch. Window washers on January 26 obtained a watch and chain, a platinum ring and a brooch, all worth \$2,000, from the home of William Becker, 250 West End avenue, the police say. A maid and a member of the family have identified Manoukin, it is understood. Shortly before this two men were seen a large sum valued at \$1,500 from the apartment of Mrs. Frank Church, 550 Park avenue. Among other apartments robbed were those of William Bayard Hale, 362 Riverside drive, and Joseph and Isaac Weisman, 885 West End avenue. The arrests were made by Acting Capt. McKenna of the Fourth Precinct.
