

GERMANS CANNOT BUY GRAIN HERE

Government Holds Tight Rein on Exports and Would Block Enemy Tricks.

BAN ON ALL FOODSTUFFS

Central Powers Will Not Be Permitted to Purchase Until Peace Comes.

There does not seem to be a single opportunity open for German agents to accumulate wheat, corn, oats or other grains in this country in anticipation of peace. The supposition in certain quarters has been that months might elapse after an armistice was signed before actual peace will have been declared, and during this interval German interests might endeavor to provide foodstuffs for their future needs.

INSPIRATION COPPER OUTPUT DROPS.

The report of the Inspiration Copper Company for September shows a decided drop in copper production as compared with the previous month. The output amounts to 7,800,000 pounds, which is 1,700,000 pounds less than in August.
