

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

They Gained a Firm Foothold in Manchuria by the Engagement Yesterday and Are Still Vigorously Pursuing the Russians, Who Are Retreating Toward the North Hills.

30,000 MEN FOUGHT ON EACH SIDE; JAPS LOST 700 AND RUSSIANS 800.

In Charge Which Resulted in Occupation of Russian Lines at Chiu Tien Cheng Troops Fell Back in Confusion-Japs Crossed River on Pontoon Bridges.

LONDON, May 2 .- News of another big battle between the Russians and Japanese at Fengwangcheng, to which point the Russians have retreated, leaving 800 dead and wounded at the Yalu River, is looked for at any time. It is considered that the Japanese by their victory of Sunday established that the Russians are not as strongly intrenched in Manchuria as was suppesed, and will continue their victorious aggressive

A battle at Fengwangcheng would prove to be an extremely bloody encounter. The Russians have been concentrating men there and it would be necessary for a big force of Japanese to attack with any hope of success. Victory for the Japanese would give them command of the great Peking road from the Yalu to Fengwangcheng and open a way for them to the railroad running down to Port Arthur.

The Japanese, although they lost 700 men in the battle-of yesterday, in which they crossed the Yalu, stormed the bluffs and captured four miles
