

BORROWED FROM SERVANT GIRL

Mrs. Luetta A. Preble, of No. 307 West Ninety-eighth Street, Strongly Censured in the City Court.

MONEY REPRESENTED THE SAVINGS OF TEN YEARS.

Judgment Had Been Obtained and Mrs. Preble Sought to Avoid Having to Answer in Supplementary Proceedings.

"Bankruptcy may relieve the payment of debt, but employers who obtain the savings of their servant girls will not be allowed to ignore the orders of this court, as they have their promises to the delinquent servant," said Justice O'Dwyer of the City Court today in denying an application in behalf of Mrs. Luetta A. Preble to excuse her for failing to appear as ordered by the court for examination in supplementary proceedings.

"Mrs. Preble is the wife of W. E. Preble, President of the Brooklyn Realty and Mortgage Company, at No. 135 Broadway," said Charles L. Hoffman, attorney for Millie Osterhammel, for whom he had entered a judgment for \$300 and interest since 1911 by the default of Mrs. Preble. "The Prebles live in elegant refinement at No. 307 West Ninety-eighth street, and when their former servant girl sued her for her life's savings, which they had borrowed from her, they fled a petition in involuntary bankruptcy. When I secured an order for Mrs. Preble to submit to examination to find out what property she might have she ignored it, and now seeks by this application to vacate the order, open her default and give her a stay for a year or until the bankruptcy court had adjudicated her case."

Against Husband, She Says.
In Mrs. Preble's affidavit she says she was adjudged a bankrupt April 2; that the claim of her ex-servant girl is really a claim against her husband, but that she gave the claim to her attorney in the bankruptcy proceeding and that it will be released by the order in bankruptcy.

"Mrs. Preble and her husband have always lived in good style, occupying expensive apartments, and there is absolutely no reason why she should not have returned to me this money, my savings, which I have earned and saved, after ten years of hard labor," said Millie Osterhammel, in an affidavit in which she says she had no knowledge of the bankruptcy proceeding or the filing of a petition in bankruptcy by the Prebles, and that she submitted this letter as proof that it was not Mrs. Preble, but his wife who borrowed the money.

"I will give Millie Storer my diamond earrings and my seal-ring, because if Mr. Preble fails to pay the amount she loaned to me," said Mrs. W. E. Preble.
Justice O'Dwyer said of the merits of the case:
"Upon the proofs submitted it appears that the plaintiff, by her thrift, saved during a period of ten years the sum of \$300, and had the same in the Greenwich Savings Bank at a time when she was employed by defendant and her husband as a domestic in their household; that defendant and her husband borrowed the money upon the pretext that it was safer with them than in the bank, and that they would pay interest thereon, and pay it back weekly. Later defendant promised to give her diamond earrings and seal-ring to secure the payment of the loan, but has failed to do so."

Should Pay the Debt.
She and her husband are living in

good style, occupying expensive apartments, and there is no explanation furnished why they have not paid back to this servant girl the money so obtained, other than a statement that they have upon their own application become bankrupts.

The judgment debtor (Mrs. Preble) willfully failed to obey the mandate of this court, and now, instead of personally appearing and paying the Court to be relieved of her default and excuse her contemptuous conduct, she sends her lawyer with an affidavit and seeks to fortify that by an affidavit of her husband.

But neither Justice O'Dwyer nor Mr. Hoffman was prepared to say in what manner the contemptuous Mrs. Preble can be punished for her contempt—with that bankruptcy proceeding in progress.

LOUBET RECEIVES ODELL.

French President Shows Familiarity with American Affairs in Talk.
PARIS, June 3.—President Loubet received Gov. Odell of New York at the Elysee Palace today. Ambassador Porter presented the Governor, who was accompanied by his son and Secretary, Mr. Manning. The President was most gracious, asking about President Roosevelt, and showing much familiarity with and interest in current American affairs.

Later Gen. Porter took Mr. Odell on a motor trip to Versailles, where the palaces and gardens were visited. Tomorrow the Ambassador will give a breakfast in honor of the Governor. The guests will include Gen. Brugue, commander of the French army, and Baron d'Estournelles de Constant.

25,000 MANTLE LAMPS FOR CITY

According to Comptroller Groot, former Commissioner of Gas and Electricity Robert Grier Monroe approves Commissioner Oakley's plan to contract with the gas companies for mantle lights at \$2.75 a year for each light. This plan has been criticized because of an increased cost of \$7 a light over the old-fashioned open flame gas light. But Commissioner Oakley has shown that the mantle light can take the place of the very high-priced electric light and save money to the city, while providing a vastly larger number of lamps.

The increase of \$7 on the mantle lights is occasioned by the additional care such lights will receive and the added cost of the mantle. It is proposed to place 25,000 of these lamps throughout the city.

The subject was discussed at the meeting of the Board of Estimate today. Comptroller Groot informed the Board that his engineers favored the idea, as did ex-Commissioner Monroe, to whom he had written for an opinion.

On the Comptroller's suggestion the matter was laid over for one week, when the contract with the gas companies will be authorized by the Board.
