Ordinarily the quarrel would have been forgotten, but something in the nature of both Mr. and Mrs. Dolder compalled frequent reference to the original cause of the dissension, until at last the originally trivial insiter grew into serious affair.

The culmination came last Saturday, when Mrs. Dolder left the house with her daughter and went to live at No. 12 Fifth avenue, taking the apartments formerly occupied by Charles M. Oei-richs. She went to the lower Fifth avenue address in order to be near her friends, Mr. and Mrs. William A. Walling. Mr. Walling is her lawyer.

Her husband knew where she had cone. He went immediately to an uptown detective agency and engaged five trained sleuths—the superintendent said they were trained, but some of the paople who watched the work say that they were overtrained. These Hawkshaws were ordered to shadow Mrs. Dolder and the child every time they left the

The detectives arranged their watches so that there were three of them on duty all the time. If Mr. Dolder was have sent a company of schoolboys attired in green uniforms, with red hats. Refere the sleuths had been on duty two hours the whole neighborhood knew

all about them.

To the relief of the watchers Mrs. Dolder entered Mr. Walling's residence, but after that there was a cab on duty in front of the house to reinforce the bicycle.

The detectives engaged a room in the largyette-Brevoort House, across the street from the apartment-house in which Mrs. Dolder was stopping, and one of them remained in the room continually, gazing across the street. At last the espionage became so ridiculous that the inewspapers got hold of it and then the amusing detectives were withdrawn.

Mrs. Dolder's handsome young woman friend called on her yesterday evening, and when she went away took the little Dolder child. Mrs. Doder refuses to reveal where the little one is, and Mr. Dolder won't say whether he knows where the child is or not. Mr. Walling refuses to discuss the affairs of his client, although Mrs. Dolder says that up to this time there have been no legal steps of any description taken.
