- SIXTY CENTS A PAIR Baby shoes of tan kid, with fancy vesting tops, leather soles; no heels; sizes 2 to 4.
- SEVENTY CENTS A PAIR Children's shoes of tan kid, with vesting tops; light spring heels; sizes 5 to 8.
- EIGHTY CENTS A PAIR Black kid and dongola, with patent leather.

The selling of Men's Shoes in the basement, at \$1, \$1.80 and \$2, and of Women's Shoes, in the shoe store, main floor, at \$1.50 and \$1.70, continues.
