WASHINGTON, April 9.—Stephen J. Field, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, retired, died at 6:30 p. m. Sunday, April 9, at his residence on the bench, Dec. 1, 1897. Justice Field had been in poor health, and when a heavy cold followed his exposure in a carriage ride on March 20, his feeble constitution was unable to withstand its ravages.
