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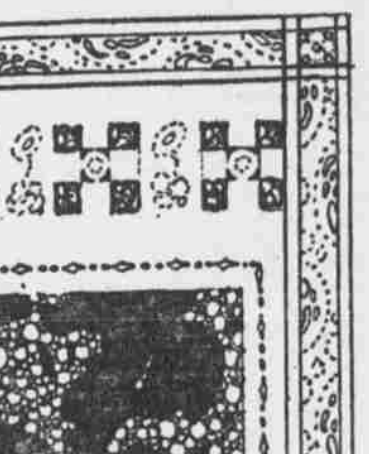
### OPPOSES CHURCH MERGER

Bishop Burch Decides in Case of Mariem Parish. Bishop Charles Sumner Burch has officially disapproved a proposition contemplating the merger of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Harlem with the Church of the Beloved Disciple in East Eighty-ninth street. The Bishop conferred for four hours with a standing committee of the diocese and the question of Harlem's future was thoroughly gone into.

Real estate experts informed clergy-men and laymen of the committee that the negro invasion would not extend below 130th street, and that in the immediate neighborhood of 125th street high class residential development would continue. This opinion killed the proposition. St. Andrew's Church will call a new year and continue its work.

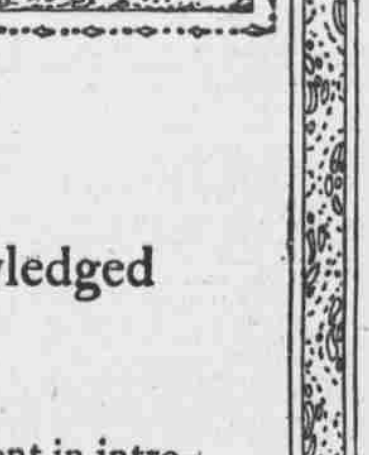
