

Western Skaters Win International Amateur Speed Championships for Men and Women in Contests at Lake Placid

McGOWAN CHAMPION OF SPEED SKATERS

St. Paul Flier Wins Half, One, Two and Three Mile International Races.

ROLLS UP 120 POINTS

Miss Rose Johnson of Chicago Proves Speediest of Women and Lowers Record.

Special to THE SUN AND NEW YORK HERALD. LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Feb. 20.—Evelyn McGowan of St. Paul, Minn., won the international outdoor ice skating championship here today. McGowan clinched the title by winning the three mile race, having previously taken first place in the half mile, one mile and two mile races and scoring a total of 120 points.

McGowan and Moore were both at their top form, and clearly showed themselves to be the best of the 120 entrants. After McGowan had won the three mile race today Moore conceded the championship to McGowan, although the 2 1/2 yard hurdle race was still undecided and both men were entered. Moore took the stand that hurdling was a specialty and not a real test of speed, and although he had an opportunity of leading McGowan and Horton, a second in this event, he did not enter.

Fast Heat Racing.

Ten heats were run in the 250 yard sprint and two to qualify in each heat. Al Leitch of Lake Placid took the first heat from B. Demere of Saranac Lake. The second heat went to George Noyar, Cleveland, with William Steinhilber, Chicago, and George Pickering, Chicago, as dead heat for second place. The Canadian, Goodman, captured the third heat, crossing the line well ahead of Cleveland. McGowan and J. Steinhorst finished fourth and fifth. In the fifth heat Ed Horton, Saranac Lake, beat Shepperd of Cleveland by five yards. Heoning of Cleveland finished sixth in the sixth heat. Topper, Chicago, getting second. Charles Jewtraw won the seventh heat easily from William Murphy, New York, going the distance in the fast time of 1:43 seconds. The eighth heat went to McGowan and Horton, also qualifying. Pickering, Verona Lake, just beat Gorman, St. John's, N. B., in the ninth heat. Joe Moore was first in the tenth heat, taking the measure of Zimmerman, Chicago, by four yards.
