RESCUES WIDOW OF CHINATOWN MAYOR

Patrolman Phil Byrne Carries Mrs. Mabel Lee Through Smoke and Flame.

MANY OTHERS ESCAPE

Fire Starts in Cellar of Mott Street Tenement Where Bales Are Stored.

Mabel Lee, the Caucasian widow of the late Tom Lee, who, as Mayor of Chinatown, ruled Mott street for many years before his death, was carried through smoke and flame last night by Patrolman Phil Byrne. Mrs. Lee was asleep in her flat at 18 Mott street when Yung Chong, who conducts an importing business at 24, opened the cellar door a few bales of stuff that the expressman had delivered early in the evening. Chong used the basement of 18 as a storage place.

HIGH BRIDGE DOOMED TO BE DEMOLISHED

War Department Order Means End of Structure.

The War Department yesterday in a communication to Acting Mayor La Guardia gave the city a year in which to remove two alternate piers of High Bridge in the Harlem River that obstruct navigation. The Acting Mayor said the order means that the bridge, which is the oldest of those connecting Manhattan with adjoining territory and is most popular with pedestrians and tourists because of its beautiful surroundings, will be demolished.

800 IN JERSEY CITY MARCH RENT STRIKE

Municipal Aid Promised in Fight on Profiteering.

Jersey City's personally conducted March rent strike began yesterday with about 800 occupants of apartment houses refusing to pay increases in rent and rates demanded by their landlords. NORTH SHORE LINES CEASE TO OPERATE

Flushing Folk Left to Hope of Hylan's Buses.

Until the New York and North Shore Traction Company is allowed to charge a 10 cent fare its trolley lines from Flushing to Whitestone and through Douglaston to Little Neck will render no more service. That ultimatum was reached yesterday afternoon by George A. Stanley, president of the company, and was a bit of a surprise.

HOUGHTON BALLOON WINS BLIZZARD RACE

Lands in Canada—Other Entrants Also Down Safe.

No further word came yesterday to the Rockaway naval air station concerning the nine officers who floated northward in balloons from the station through a blizzard Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning in an unofficial race. All are known to have made safe landings, however. It was stated that the balloon commanded by Lieut. A. H. Houghton, accompanied by Lieut. Stephen Farrell and Ensign E. C. Hulett, had apparently won, since it arrived at Reaching, Quebec, Canada, while another, commanded by Ensign L. A. Kloor, reached Orleans, Vt., and the Lieut. under Lieut. Carpenter, touched ground at Canaan, N. Y.

TEN CAR EXPRESSES ORDERED IN SUBWAY

More and Longer Locals Also to Be Put on by I. R. T.

The investigation by Lewis Nixon, Public Service Commissioner, into the Interborough's subway service frustrated yesterday in an order, effective March 10, for ten instead of eight or six car expresses throughout the day and an increase in the number of local trains in the West Side subway during rush hours.

HOLLAND TUNNEL PLAN IS APPROVED

Engineers of Two States Reject Goethals Type.

The board of consulting engineers for the New York and New Jersey Hudson River Tunnels Commission put a definite end yesterday to the argument between the champions of the Goethals type of tunnel and the plans drawn up by Chief M. Holland, the joint commission's chief engineer. With the exception of Edward A. Byrne, the only member of the board not present, the consulting engineers endorsed the Holland plan and set forth through Mr. Holland their reasons.

LIQUOR SIGNS DOWN BY FEDERAL ORDER

Even the name of whiskey and its alcohol confederates disappeared from yearning eyes in New York City yesterday in response to the order of James E. Shevlin, Federal supervising prohibition agent here, that signs advertising liquor in any form be removed or obliterated.
