

LICENSE TAX FOR STOCK DIVIDENDS

Measure Proposed in View of Court Decision.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—A prohibitive tax on the privilege of issuing stock dividends was proposed to-day by Representative Green (Iowa) as a means of preventing large corporations from evading payment of a large share of their taxes under the Supreme Court decision of Monday, which held that dividends paid in stock are not taxable as income. Because of loss of revenue as the result of the decision Mr. Green will insist that action be taken by the committee Monday. It is probable that more definite recommendations of the Treasury Department as to how to meet the situation will be ready by that time.

Under Mr. Green's plan the privilege of issuing stock dividends would be taxed according to the market value of the security. He does not believe such a levy can be successfully attacked on constitutional grounds. He proposes to make this tax rate so high that the stockholders will find it more profitable to take their dividends in cash and pay the tax rather than to have them issued virtually restate the present revenues.

Mr. Green does not believe the tax could be made retroactive and that under any conditions the Government must refund the amounts collected on stock dividends during the years 1917 and 1918.

The Comptroller of the Treasury today, in a letter to Representative Fordney (Mich.), chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, said that a checking of the 1917 and 1918 returns showed that the Government must hand back about \$30,000,000. The loss for 1919, the re-

turns of which must be in by Monday, will be much larger, the Comptroller said.
