PERSONAL INTELLIGENCE. FRANK MOSS, VICE PRESIDENT, IS DEAD. Former Assistant District Attorney Was Leading Figure in Parkhurst Raids.

Frank Moss, former Assistant District Attorney under William Tamm, died at his home in Parkhurst, N. Y., this morning. He was one of the best known lawyers and criminal investigators in this city; died late last night in his home, 23 West 127th street. Mr. Moss had been in ill health for some time, but he had been in the hospital in Roosevelt Hospital, suffering from general breakdown. Some time ago, however, he had recovered, and at his own request was removed to his home. While Mr. Moss was in the hospital, his condition grew steadily worse.

With Mr. Moss when he died were his wife, who was Miss Eva E. Bruce, whom he married in 1885; his son, the Rev. Albert H. Moss, and his daughter, Miss Elizabeth J. Moss. Mr. Moss was head of the law firm of Moss, Marcus & Weiss, 203 Broadway. Besides his legal and political activities, he was a member of the New York City Church Extension Society and the New York Yacht Club. He was also a member of the Bar Association, the New York Law Institute, the New York Historical Association and the Union League and Republican Club.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Rear Admiral Albert Winterhalter, a member of the General Board and former commander in chief of the Asiatic fleet, died suddenly in the Naval Hospital here today. He was the cause of the Admiral's death. He had been ill only a few days. Admiral Winterhalter was born in Detroit sixty-four years ago and was appointed to the Naval Academy in 1877.
