

## STIRLING, EARL'S SON, WINS SUIT FOR A DIVORCE

Court Decides Against Wife, Who Was Miss Taylor, of New Jersey.

EDINBURGH, March 10.—The sensational Stirling cross divorce suits were decided today by Lord Guthrie, who granted the husband's petition, awarded him the custody of his child and denied the cross petition of Mrs. Stirling.

John Alexander Stirling, Laird of Kippendale, was married three years ago to Clara Elizabeth Taylor, an American show girl, who came from New Jersey. Last fall cross suits for divorce were filed, Mr. Stirling naming Lord Northland and Mrs. Stirling Mrs. Atherton as co-respondents.

In giving his judgment, Lord Guthrie said the case had no legal interest and that it should not have any public interest. Most of the evidence had been taken up with the petty questions of selfish and idle lives which contained little or nothing romantic and little that was even mock heroic.

Mr. Stirling, he said, in meeting Mrs. Atherton had welcomed an introduction he should have shunned. Continuing Lord Guthrie discredited the idea of a plot to get rid of Mrs. Stirling by forcing her to a guilty affection for Lord Northland, but he thought that her letters to Lord Northland were indicative of guilty relations.

Lord Northland's counsel immediately gave notice of an appeal. Both Lord Northland and Mr. Stirling were present in court when the decision was rendered.

The attorney for Mrs. Stirling also announced that he would appeal the decision.

### DISPUTE OVER \$5,000.

Receiver Montague, of Gotham Hotel, Says It Was Wrongly Paid.

Montague said Goodwin had admitted to him he had received this sum from the company on the very day the fifteenth Street Company, one of the creditors, stripped the Gotham of all its property. Mr. Goodwin was vice-president of the creditor company. Mr. Montague said this payment to Mr. Goodwin was in violation of the Stock Corporation law.

Mr. Goodwin declares that this \$5,000 was paid to him as his compensation for his services as manager and superintendent of the hotel, and that he was entitled to it under the laborers' wages law, as a preferred claim.

Decision was reserved.

THINK TEACHERS TOO OLD.

Three Bayonne Principals, G. A. R. Veterans, May Be Retired.

Three principals of public schools in Bayonne, N. J., are said to be slated for retirement by the Board of Education tomorrow night. It is said the only objection to them is their age, all being more than 60 years old. They have been notified to be prepared to retire on Dec. 1, but as all are members of the G. A. R. and the Gen. Sherman and Gen. Mansfield posts, are expected to make a fight against this removal.

## HUGHES URGES ACTION ON TAX AMENDMENTS.

Asks Legislature to Open Way for Disposition of Litigation Involving \$41,000,000.

ALBANY, March 10.—Gov. Hughes sent a special message to the Legislature today in which he urged careful consideration of recommendations by Attorney-General O'Malley for amendments to the tax law to facilitate the early disposition of the mass of litigation involving about \$41,000,000 in special franchise taxes.

Accompanying the message was a letter received by the Governor from the Attorney-General outlining the proposed amendments and the reasons why he believes they should be enacted into law. The proposed amendments are designed to take franchise tax cases now pending before referees on certain proceedings and bring them to trial forthwith before the Supreme Court.

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## ELEVATOR FALLS, ONE MAN INJURED

Accident at Belt Line Car Barn Causes Report That Many Are Hurt.

Through the breaking of a cogwheel, an elevator fell from the first to the ground floor at the car barns of the Belt Line at No. 44 West Fifty-fourth street this morning and one man, the runner, was slightly injured. Wind rumormongers followed the crash, and at first it was reported that many had been seriously injured.

Frank Casey, thirty-three years old, of No. 111 East One Hundred and Second street, was running the car and had started it for the top floor. When it reached the first a cogwheel holding the cables snapped and the car shot down to the ground floor. Casey managed to get out without aid, but employees had heard the crash, and, without making an investigation first, telephoned to Police Headquarters that several had been injured.

When they went to the shaft they found Casey suffering from contusions about the left arm and leg. Dr. Brown removed him to Flower Hospital.

## HOTEL GUEST ROBBED.

Bessie Vaughan, twenty-four years old, of No. 208 East Eighty-eighth street, a cleaner employed at the Hotel St. Hubert, No. 128 West Fifty-ninth street, and John Moore, twenty-seven, a driver living at No. 34 St. Nicholas avenue, arrested last night by Detectives Corrette and Murphy, were arraigned before Magistrate Harris in the West Side Court this morning. They were charged with stealing clothes and a gold watch and chain from J. R. Coffin, a guest at the hotel, on March 7. Both waived examination and were held at \$1,000 each for trial.
