CRASHED INTO AN ICEBERG.

DR. COOK'S ARCTIC PLEASURE PARTY RETURNS TO ST. JOHN'S.

The Miranda Collides With an Iceberg North of Newfoundland—After Landing the Labrador Parties, the Vessel Put Back for Repairs—She Will Start for Greenland Again in a Few Days. ST. JOHN'S, N. F., July 24.—The steamer Miranda, carrying the Cook Arctic expedition to Greenland, consisting of fifty-four persons, professors, scientific men, university students, and others, which left here on Sunday, July 15, returned this morning disabled, having collided with an iceberg at the entrance to the Straits of Belle Isle.

WELLMAN'S ARCTIC PARTY.
