HOW MASSACHUSETTS STANDS.

Eastern exchanges containing full reports of the Massachusetts Republican State Convention show that Blaine was nowhere or anywhere else in the Convention. Grant had quite a following, and Sherman was ahead of the Maine candidate, but Edmunds of Vermont exceeded all three in the proportion of about three to one. The Convention consisted of 1,100 delegates from all parts of the State, and was convened for the purpose of electing four delegates at large to the Chicago Convention. Four ex-Governors, Boutwell, Banks, Rice and Claflin, led the Grant men and tried to sweep the Convention, but their speeches only provoked a louder anti-third term response. The Grant and Blaine men combined their forces, while the Sherman men, believing that Edmunds would not be a candidate before the Chicago Convention and that his vote would go to their favorite, voted for Edmunds delegates. Some of the speakers asserted that the moral influence of Massachusetts had killed Blaine in the National Convention four years ago, and that it would do so again. Resolutions were adopted demanding candidates for President and Vice-President, who would not put the party on the defensive, and obligating the delegates to use all proper efforts for the nomination of candidates who, having the requisite qualifications for the high offices, will also have the confidence and approval of all who have hitherto acted with the Republican party. George F. Hoar, C. E. Codman, John E. Sanford and Julius E. Sealie, President of Amherst College, were elected delegates by overwhelming majorities, and each and all of them are opposed to Grant and Blaine.

TILDEN'S BAR!

The Virginia Enterprise has an article on Tilden's bar! of money, in which it is intimated that the defrauded President has secured control of several prominent newspapers in Nevada, which are to be used to give him the appearance of strength, for the effect it may have on other parts of the country. There are only three very prominent newspapers in Nevada, and they are the Virginia Enterprise, the Virginia Chronicle, and the Eureka Sentinel. As the Enterprise is supplied unsparingly from the bags of the Virginia and Truckee Railroad and the Nevada Bank's bar!s, it is not likely that it requires any nutriment from Tilden's. "The several prominent newspapers" are therefore reduced to two, and there is no evidence whatever that they are subsidized by Tilden. In the Presidential campaign of 1876 the Enterprise and other corporation papers in Nevada had much to say about the lavishness of Tilden in money matters, and charged that he had sent a full bar! to Nevada; yet the SILVER STATE knows, and can prove, that neither the Democratic State Central Committee or anybody else paid a dime for the political advertisements published in its columns by the said State Central Committee. If Tilden ever sent a bar! or any part of a bar! of money to Nevada, not one cent of it ever reached Humboldt; yet this county gave him a clear majority of 125 votes out of a total vote of less than 900.

TILDEN AND TAMMANY CONVENTIONS.

The Tilden and anti-Tilden Conventions were held at Syracuse, New York, last Wednesday. The Tilden Convention eulogized Tilden, and denounced the elevation of Hayes to the Presidency, and elected the following delegates at large to the National Convention: Lucius Robinson, Calvin E. Pratt, Rufus W. Peckham. Alternates, Wm. Henderson, James F. Starbuck, E. B. Hart, R. A. Parmeter.

The Tammany Convention adopted resolutions declaring Tilden's nomination fatal to the party and treason to the cause of the people. An address to the Democracy of New York was adopted denouncing Tilden as a personalism false to Democracy and dangerous to the Republic, and declaring him unfit for office and sure of defeat. The

following delegates at large to the National Convention were elected: A. J. Parker, W. Dorsheimer, J. McGurse, and J. C. Green. Alternates, I. W. McConihe, E. T. Wood, J. S. Coarse and A. S. Page.

The Virginia Chronicle says a private dispatch from New York, received in Virginia City, says a fearful accident occurred night before last at Madison Square Gardens. An art exposition was being held in the immense building and there were a great many visitors. Suddenly the roof fell in and crushed a number of persons to death. The dispatch stated that twenty dead bodies had already been removed. The number of injured was very large.

The storm on Sunday night destroyed the town of El Paso, in White county, Arkansas, due north of Little Rock thirty miles; several lives are reported lost. The latest advices show that the storm on Sunday night was widespread. In the northern part of the State, in the neighborhood of Fayetteville and Blandville, much damage was done and loss of life is reported. At El Paso Dr. Hainston and wife and Mr. Paul, wife and four children were killed.

The latest advices from Texas county, Mo., say that the town of Licking has been entirely destroyed, excepting three houses, by Sunday night's storm, three hundred persons being rendered homeless, one life lost and 17 persons wounded, five of them seriously. The damage is fully \$50,000. The tornado did immense injury to all kinds of property in the country.

A Mason Valley rancher, a Frenchman named J. P. Pareut, who was driving a four-horse team, attempted to cross the railroad track in front of a train that was pulling out for Virginia City, yesterday. The engine dashed into the team, killing the driver and two horses and smashing the wagon into kindling wood.

A grand philological fete or polyglot academy was held at the vatican in honor of the exaltation of Pope Leo XIII. The diplomatic body, nobility, arch-bishops, etc., were presented. Scholars of the propaganda recited poems in forty-nine different languages extolling the Pope.

The Virginia City Democratic Convention nominated J. C. Currie for Mayor, George Brown for Chief of Police, John A. Mahanny for City Tax Collector, J. B. Mallon for City Treasurer, D. A. Moriarty for Assessor, and R. B. Mitchell for City Attorney.

It is announced that Frederick A. Tritle, of Virginia City, is a candidate for United States Senator to succeed Sharon, of California. Mr. Tritle is a Republican, but he is a resident of the State, and not, so far as is known, in league with the monopolies.

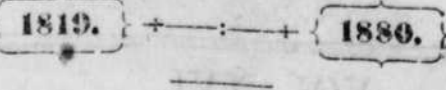
