Cattle Shipped.
Over four hundred head of beef cattle were shipped from this station to San Francisco last night; making, when loaded, a train of twenty-six cars. Fifteen carloads belonged to Johnson & Catalow and eleven to S. S. Bailey, who is purchasing beefs for a San Francisco slaughtering firm.
Naches Quite Sick.
We learn from the Pines that their honored chief and advisor, Naches, is very sick with pneumonia at his ranch on the Big Meadows. As he is a sensible Indian, and has always counseled his tribe to live at peace with the pale faces, whites as well as Indians will regret that he is seriously ill, and hope for his speedy recovery.

In Town.
C. L. Meader, who for several months past has been working the Jersey Mine, on a lease from the company which expired some two weeks ago, arrived in town last night. Under his management of the mine, some thirty or forty miners, several "ore sorters" and a number of teamsters were employed, all of whom have been thrown out of work by the expiration of his lease.

THE BLACK HILLS.

A Country of Cities-Pleasant Weather-Claims Located and General Prospects-No Trouble From Indians.

HAYWARD CITY, Feb. 5, 1877.

SILVER STATE-Thinking a few lines from the Hills might be of interest your correspondent avails himself of a leisure moment to pen or rather pencil them, as ink is scarce.

Hayward City is the capital or principal town of Last Chance or Middle District, on Battle Creek, Harney District being above and Rosebush below, Harney City and Battle City being their respective capitals. The off hand way in which the word city is piled on to every collection of ten or fifteen cabins would excite the envy of a 49er. Battle Creek, like many other creeks in the Hills, is quite flat, and although it is but five or six feet to bed rock, the mines are rather hard to open. Very little work has been done as yet, but the creek prospects well wherever it has been tried. Water is scarce at present, but the miners get more than they want as soon as they begin to sink. Claims are located along the creek for more than twenty miles, and any number of side creeks and gulches are claimed. If one claim in twenty turns out well this will be a good mining country.

There is a great deal of quartz around here and very many ledges have been located. Some of them look well but the ore has not been tested yet.

The weather has been splendid for the last two weeks, and much prospecting has been done in that time. The snow has disappeared except in the deep cauyons and on the north side of the hills, and if the weather continues favorable there will be considerable placer mining done this month. Money is scarce, but a person doesn't notice it so much here, as gold miners' wants are few and they don't require much capital for their business.

The Indians have not troubled us this winter, but this fine weather may thaw them out. They made it so warm on this creek last summer that the few whites had to leave, but I do not think they will try to run off the present crowd, which is a little too large for them to fool with.

While speaking of Hayward, I forgot to say that it is a regularly laid-out town, and consists of about twenty houses, including four groceries and a blacksmith shop. Two lots are reserved for a school-house and church. The town is governed by a City Council, Justice of the Peace and City Marshal.

It has also started that indispensable adjunct to a new mining town, a grave-yard; but, perhaps, I should say that the town was started as an adjunct of the grave-yard--a miner having accidentally shot himself before the town was laid out.

On the 1st instant, two men had a shooting scrape here in which one was mortally wounded. A miners' meeting was called immediately, for 11 o'clock a. m. (the shooting was done in the morning), a jury was impaneled, counsel appointed and the case was tried and the prisoner acquitted, before 4 o'clock p. m. The verdict gave general satisfaction, as the evidence showed conclusively that the slain man was the aggressor. More anon.

DISTRICT COURT.

January Term 1877.

WM. S. BONNIFIELD, JUDGE.

In the case of the State vs. Harry Thompson, indicted by the name of Huff: Counsel for defendant moved the court that judgment be not entered in the verdict of murder in the first degree, against the defendant, for the reason that the indictment does not comply with the provisions of the Criminal Practice Act in this: "The statement of the acts charged in the indictment do not constitute the offense of murder in the first degree. The facts stated in the indictment do not constitute a public offense because it is not charged in the indictment that the killing was with felonious intent and it is not stated that William McRavy was a human being. A motion for a new trial was also made upon the following grounds:

First, The verdict is contrary to law and evidence.

Second, The court misdirected the jury in matters of law excepted to in the trial.

The motions were argued at length by counsel for the defense, and the prosecution, and submitted to the Court who took them under advisement.

Thomas Barnby vs. H. H. Smith, on appeal from Bnena Vista Township; Case tried and judgment rendered for plaintiff.

Washington's Birthday.

To-morrow, February 22nd, will be the 145th anniversary of Washington's birthday, the Father of his Country having been born in the colony of Virginia in the year 1732. Tilden has been legally elected President of these United States. As their decision will undoubtedly settle the vexed question beyond all cavil or dispute, we could not consistently deny them the pleasure of so worthily improving a splendid opportunity to indelibly write their names upon the historical scroll of famous men.

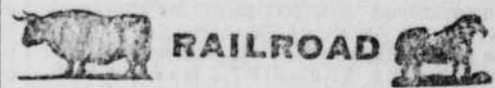
