FORECAST OF A BIG OIL FIELD

Tonopah stockholders and promoters of Fallon oil companies are going around with a million dollar smile due to a report on the Fallon field recently submitted by Mr. A. E. Wiley, the noted geologist and engineer.

Mr. Wiley spent sixteen days examining the Fallon district. He attaches considerable importance to United States Bulletin No. 530, which shows the location of a test well put down by the government in 1911. This well was sunk for potash to a depth of 825 feet. The log shows oil seepage at 125 feet, 135 feet and 390 feet; also shale-clay seams with fossils of the tertiary period below the 600-foot level.

"Undoubtedly," states Mr. Wiley, "the oil strata would have been encountered in this well if continued to 1,500 feet, as all oil tests in this field show a good paraffin base and oil of paraffin character as a rule found within that depth."

In summing up Mr. Wiley states: "I believe that the district is a very promising one for exploration for oil and that striking wells in the most favored places in that district is likely to yield fabulously rich returns. From geological conditions, as they are found in that district, I can reach but one conclusion and that is that the chances for bringing in one of the big oil fields of the nation."

Mr. Wiley has a nationwide reputation as an expert geologist and his report will no doubt greatly increase the interest in the various prospective oil fields of Nevada and especially in the Fallon field.

SLOT MACHINES ARE OUT AGAIN

Holding that the constitutional provision prohibiting lotteries in the state of Nevada can not be held to apply to slot machines, because at the time the constitution was framed slot machines had not been thought of, the state supreme court yesterday afternoon handed down a decision which authorizes the operation of machines under a statute passed by the legislature in 1915.

The court's opinion holds that it was not the intention of the framers of the constitution to prohibit the operation of slot machines. It also holds that it could not have been the intention of the legislature to prohibit slot machines because it enacted a special statute regulating the operation of such machines. The court holds that it is not unlawful to operate slot machines under the special statute. The act in question is an amendment to the anti-gambling law and that portion of it relating to the operation of slot machines.

Provided, however, that nothing in this paragraph shall be construed as prohibiting a nickel-in-the-slot machine for the sale of cigars and drinks and no playback allowed.

The matter was laid before the state supreme court by agreement between District Attorney Summerfield and Hort Norcross, Thatcher, Woodburn and Henley, attorneys for the slot machine men.

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FIRST NEVADA BOY IN FRANCE

Joe Servanti is back, fresh from service with the First Division of Pershing's own men who were first to fight and last to leave France. Joe was attached to the bodyguard of the American commander and was with him in all the big battles.

Joe carries two wound straps, having been gassed and sent back to the hospital a second time suffering from two wounds which kept him in the hospital for two months. Servanti was the first man from Nevada to go across and was straddled with the regulars as a replacement man. Leaving here October 7, 1917, Joe went to Camp Lewis and in two months was in France. The departure of the young dairyman was one of the most pathetic scenes enacted at the Tonopah depot, which will be well remembered for, as the boys swung around the train Joe Servanti led the crowd in singing "When I was a child and you were a man."

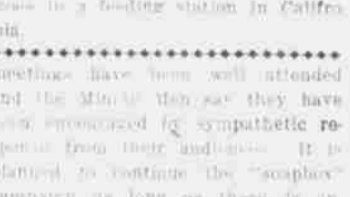

STOCK SHIPPED TO CALIFORNIA

The first shipment of feeder stock from southern Nevada went out last night at 5:30 after the day from smump had been spent in loading 1,500 head of stock into thirty cars. The work was slow owing to the absence of a yard of coral where the wild animals would be impounded and gradually led into the chute. The stock belonged to the United Cattle and Packing company whose force of bookkeepers conducted the work of loading. This is the first shipment of feeder stock from the southern country, as it is the rule for the stock to travel on the native tracks of the Nevada country until they are turned out and ready for the market. The year's death left the cargo in such impoverished shape that the stock is weakened and scarcely able to work. Some of the animals had gone such long distances after water that they dropped in two weeks and could only be saved by prompt attention. The shipment was to a feeding station in California.
