## Utah & Pacific's New Tariff to Lund.

EFFECTIVE ON APRIL 15TH.

Effective April 15th, a new freight tariff will be published by the Utah & Pacific. The tariffs are not made up yet but the advance figures given The Tribune show a decided reduction in all class rates as for example 5 cents per hundred pounds lower in first class, 7 cents in second, 4 cents in third and so on. The detailed figures will be as follows:

As soon as the line reaches Escalante station, sixty-five miles out, a tariff in conformity will be published which will be based on the same mileage arrangement, the first class rate to that point to be less than 1 cent a mile.

When the first tariff was put in it was but temporary, and a fair trial proved the figures to be too high and teaming to Milford was kept up by some. The new tariff will be a welcome bit of news to shippers in the south and it is expected that traffic over the road will be visibly increased.

### CHANGES TERMINUS.

Utah & Pacific will Stop Just Inside Border of Utah.

Chief Engineer West of the Utah & Pacific is up from the end of the track with the report that 15 miles are now remaining to be built.

By April 15th, Escalante will be reached and trains will therefore be operated to that point next week. It is sixty-five miles from Milford.

Mr. West announces quite a little change in the plans of the company as to the terminus at Stateline. It was decided to create the permanent station at Uvada, 75.5 miles from Milford. This is near the line but in the State of Nevada and for the Utah & Pacific to terminate there it would mean an extra incorporation in Nevada. As the Utah, Nevada & California is incorporated to build from the stateline, the Utah & Pacific will not attempt to do so but will stop just within the Utah border at a station to be called McCune in honor of the president of the company. In mileage it makes but little difference but looking forward it might be a significant fact in relation to the continuance of the line through Nevada. Escalante will be the shipping point for St. George, Hebron, Deeridge, Pinto, Stateline and other points. Freight and passenger tariffs will be figured out at once.—Tribune.

Central Pacific will be Surely Consolidated.

London.—The Central Pacific railroad adjustment managers announce that as over 87 1/2% of the bondholders have assented to the re-organization plan, it is declared in operation.

The importance of the announcement that all agree to the plan of Central Pacific re-adjustment, cannot be overestimated. In the first place it means that C. P. Huntington has won, and the rumors that the Vanderbilts would take the Central Pacific or some other syndicate would control it, will go for naught. It may have an important bearing also on the new line to Los Angeles, for now that Huntington has bought at so high a figure, he will have to adopt a new policy, that of bettering the Central Pacific. With the latter being pushed to the front, it means that the local conditions will be more closely watched by the Southern Pacific, and as competition would hurt both their lines, it may be necessary for them to build that line, Long is surveying.

All arguments in the past have been given with the thought that the Central Pacific would be lost by the Southern Pacific.—Tribune.

Utah mines are taking higher and higher rank every day. Men are dropping in here all the time from the Eastern States, asking about them; inquiries are coming in by letter every day, and, come to look around, the fact is made plain, that with the exception of Cripple Creek, which is about all reduced now to the control of settled companies, there is not a spot in the country on which the attention of mining men is half so much concentrated as it is upon Utah. And the reasons why are plain enough. The mines here are more numerous and average better than in any other spot. This is going to be a great season in Utah mining.—Tribune.

## Accident to Wife of Utah & Pacific Agent at Lund.

R. L. Noel, agent at Lund is in the city with his wife. The latter met with a painful and serious accident on Tuesday night. She was lying down reading, when a jarring of the temporary quarters used by the agent caused a bit of iron to fall from the ceiling and hitting her fairly in the eye, causing such a wound that it is very likely her eye will have to be removed. The accident is deplored by the many friends of the couple at the end of the track, as well as their older friends in railroad circles.—Tribune.

## SILVER TRUST.

Formed for the Purpose of Raising The Price of Silver.

Topeka, [Kas.].—J. T. Graham of Denver, who owns extensive gold and silver mines in Colorado and New Mexico and copper mines in Utah, passed through Topeka today on his way home. Mr. Graham operates smelting plants at his various mines and he has been in New York in attendance at the meeting of smelter operators, which resulted in the perfection of a gigantic trust with a capital of \$65,000,000.

While in this city Mr. Graham made the important statement that the first step made by the new trust would be to advance the price of silver 10 per cent.

"This is a trust that will prove beneficial instead of oppressive," said Mr. Graham. "All the smelter operators who entered into a combine signed a contract agreeing not to raise the price on the treatment of ore for ten years."

"The advance in silver will be made within a short time," continued Mr. Graham, "just as soon as the combine can be perfected."—Gazette.

ARBOR DAY.

Governor Sadler, has appointed April 21st as Arbor Day, and he earnestly recommends that said day be observed by the people of the State in the planting of Trees and Shrubs and in adornment of public and private grounds and by appropriate exercises and ceremonies in the Public Schools.—He says "I would further suggest that after the planting is done, let not the main object be forgotten, 'care for and cultivate' that growth and beauty may follow."
