Meeting of the Union State Central Committee.

At a meeting of the State Central Committee of the Union Party of Nevada, held pursuant to call, February 10, 1868, it was ordered as follows:

That a State Convention for the purpose of selecting delegates to represent the State in the convention of the National Union Republican Party, called to meet in Chicago on the 20th of May, 1868, be called to meet in Carson City on the 8th day of April next.

That delegates to said convention be apportioned as follows:

- One for each county, and
One for each Senator and Representative to which such county is entitled.

That the several county Central Committees be instructed to provide for the election of Delegates to the State Convention; said elections to be by direct vote at the Primaries, or by conventions--as the committees may direct.

That at the Primaries for the selection of delegates, the following test be recommended, whenever a challenge shall be made to the right of a party to vote:

"Did you, at the last election for State officers, support the Union ticket?" "And will you, at the next Presidential election, support the nominees of the National Republican party?"

ALABAMA.

Senator Sherman proposes as direct and certain a "thoroughfare" for the subjugation of Alabama rebels as his brother conceived of when he started through Georgia on his march to the sea.

In opposition to this measure of Sherman's, the Copperheads will quote the inviolability of that provision of the Reconstruction Act which requires a majority vote of all persons registered as a necessity to the adoption of the new Constitutions.

Can it be possible that the Copperheads on the Supreme Bench united in the late opinion, dismissing the Georgia case, in order to put Congress off its guard and defer action with relation to the proposed law requiring a two-third or unanimous decision upon Constitutional questions, and thus to secure to themselves a clear field in which to operate upon the McCardie case?

TELEGRAPHIC POSTAL COMMUNICATION. It is assuring to the public that the matter is being vigorously pursued. Says the Washington Chronicle of the 28th ult.:

Mr. Washburne, of Illinois, is busily engaged in perfecting his bill to secure telegraphic postal communication with all parts of the United States.

The British Press evinces a disposition upon the part of British politicians to evade the mistakes of the past with regards to American affairs, by applauding the popular sentiment of the country as evinced toward General Grant.

BY STATE TELEGRAPH.

NEW ORLEANS, February 11.—After a stormy debate, the Convention adopted a resolution allowing the members and employes 30 per cent. additional pay.

LITTLE ROCK, February 11.—The Convention has adopted the Constitution as a whole, without being printed, after five hours debate. It provides for 20 Senators and 80 Representatives.

HAVANA, February 11.—President Cabral of St. Domingo has fallen from power and abandoned the Capital. General Hurgria has assumed the reins of government.

TALLAHASSEE, February 11.—The majority portion of the Convention has had a session, and expelled Billings and several members of the minority, and passed an ordinance to issue bonds to the amount of \$15,000 to pay the expenses of the Convention.

TALLAHASSEE, February 12.—The majority of the Convention has entered a protest against the action of the minority, and deposed its officers, elected new ones and passed a resolution declaring that the Convention has power to compel the attendance of absentees.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, February 12.—Secretary Seward's reply to the request of Governor Hayes for the return of all papers concerning the ratifications of the Constitutional Amendment by Ohio says there is no law permitting the withdrawal of any documents from the State Department at the request of individuals or States.

NEW YORK, February 12.—The Herald's Constantinople special says the United States steamer Ticonderoga, of nine guns, has arrived off the coast of Crete, under special orders from Farragut.

CHICAGO, February 12.—Washington specials say the prospects of impeachment are fading away. The Senate Judiciary Committee are opposed to Edmonds' bill regulating the proceedings in cases of impeachment, and providing for suspension of officers after articles are presented.

Jerry Black is preparing another case to test the validity of the Reconstruction Acts. He proceeds against General Meade for using money from the Treasury of Georgia.

NEW YORK, February 12.—The press all comment on the Grant and Johnson correspondence.

The Tribune says Grant has utterly overthrown the charge of insubordination, and that Johnson appears willing to wound but afraid to strike.

The Herald declares for Grant for President.

The Times says Grant may have been hasty and may have given the President to understand he would aid in keeping Stanton out, but no doubt he prepared him for his final action.

The World says Grant is convicted of duplicity. He has pursued a tortuous and unmanly course.

The Sun says the net wherein the President and four of his Secretaries sought to ensnare Grant has been utterly destroyed.

The Post says the President merely plays the seald.

The Commercial thinks both the President and Grant acted honestly, and regards the conflict as one of the miserable results of Radicalism.

CONGRESSIONAL

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, February 12.—Sherman introduced a bill declaring that Alabama, having adopted its Constitution by the majority of those voting, shall be declared to be a State entitled to be restored to the right of representation in Congress.

Conness introduced a bill to grant land in aid of a railroad from Vallejo to Humboldt, California. Referred.

Yates from the Committee on Territories reported a bill for the admission of Colorado, and gave notice that he would call it up at an early day.

Morrill called up the resolution inquiring into the forcible ejection of colored employes from the cars of Alexandria and Georgetown railroad.

In the course of debate, Conness urged the immediate consideration of the rights of American citizens abroad. He complained of the delay of the Committee on Foreign Affairs in acting on his resolution introduced last month.

The resolution passed. A bill for the promulgation of the laws of Congress was passed, after which the Senate went into executive session and adjourned.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, February 12.—Wilson of Iowa introduced a bill for the surrender of persons convicted of certain crimes. It provides that no person duly convicted of murder, piracy, assassination, arson, robbery or forgery shall be allowed to enter or remain in the United States.

The bill drafted by the Secretary of State, concerning the rights of American citizens, came up. After some remarks Banks moved the previous question, which cut up further amendments. The House refused to sustain the demand for the previous question by a decided majority.

The morning hour having expired the House went into Committee of the Whole upon the General Appropriation bill. No new points were developed, and without disposing of the bill the committee rose, and the House adjourned.

VALUABLE SURFACE ORES.—Says yesterday's Enterprise:

A great deal of prospecting is at present being done in the outcroppings of abandoned mines lying from one to five miles eastward of the great Comstock lode, and in many instances paying ore has been found upon and near the surface.
