From the Virginia Enterprise of Sunday.

SAN FRANCISCO, February 29.—To-day the Grand Jury failed to find an indictment against Mr. Robitschek for the killing of Eisner, and the charge was accordingly dismissed.

The Grand Jury have found indictments against Mike Brannigan and Harriet Skillman on two charges of conspiracy, and Edward Hooford on three charges to commit rape.

Advices from Mendocino county state that the Albion lumber mills at Albion river were totally destroyed by fire on the 21st instant.

A humpback cow whale was captured in the bay yesterday afternoon, near Red Rock, by a boat's crew from the whaling bark N. S. Perkins.

Some alarm is felt for the safety of the Western Belle, which has been out 23 days between San Francisco and Victoria. She was last seen 48 hours after she left San Francisco. Captain Moorehouse reported on February 12 having seen a portion of the wreck of a ship off Cape Mendocino, supposed to have been the wreck of this vessel. The first steamship pioneers of California last night celebrated the nineteenth anniversary of their arrival by a grand dinner at Martin's Restaurant.

Stephen J. Moore, examined in the Police Court on a charge of obtaining money from J. R. Hibbetts, was held to answer before the Grand Jury to-day and his bail fixed at \$2,500.

E. P. Peckham who has filed a petition in bankruptcy, owes \$70,397; his assets amount to \$109,024.

A. J. Houghtaling of this city has filed his petition also. Liabilities, \$2,490; no assets.

The Sacramento sailed for Panama this morning, carrying 231 passengers and \$654,061 in treasure.

The steamer Del Norte arrived to-day from Victoria.

Private telegrams give the price of gold in New York to-day at 141 1/2; sterling 109 1/2 @ 110 1/2.

Legal tenders continue to be quoted at 70 1/2 buying, and 71 selling.

California wheat in Liverpool is to-day quoted at 16s., a decline of 2d.

Flour—The market is apparently without movement.

Wheat—Market inactive at \$2 65 @ 2 70 for shipping, and \$2 75 for prime milling.

Barley—Choice feed, \$1 95. At the close 700 sacks Chevalier sold at \$2.

Oats—Small lots from store have been sold as high as \$2 @ 2 05. We quote the range of market at \$1 90 @ 2.

The Poacher's Dog.—A dog between a bull-dog and a grayhound, or between a grayhound and a terrier, makes the best "latcher," or poacher's dog. You may generally know a poacher's dog when you see him. He looks very sleepy in the daytime, and seems stupid for the want of a good night's rest. Moreover, he seems slyer and subtler than other dogs. There is too much of the Jesuit about him to enable him to pass for an honest dog, and he sulkily does the bidding of his master with the air of one who must either do it or die. He is seldom in good spirits, and when on some rare occasions he wags his tail he does it as if he were ashamed of himself. Poacher's dogs are employed, not for catching game, but for running into the nets. They are taught to scour a field in the darkest nights, and work all the hares and rabbits toward the nets in the gateway, or on the covert sides. Sometimes they are put to watch their master's net, and will fly at any one who attempts to interfere with it. They never give mouth under any circumstances, being too well trained to fall into that error. A Shropshire farmer once told us good stories about a poacher's dog. He had been trained to run away from his master when called to approach him, and never to give mouth under any circumstance. Once upon a time this same poacher was before the magistrates, and the keepers tried to identify him by his dog. The animal was brought into court as the supposed property of the poacher. This he stoutly denied. He was told to call the dog to him, which he did, and immediately the terrified dog scampered out of court.

GRANT.—Hon. J. F. Benjamin of Missouri, writing from Washington January 30th says:

Of his soundness none need question. He is fully understood here by both friends and foes. He is no political trickster, and what little he does say is full of meaning. A man's works are worth more than his professions, and in that respect Grant has proved himself.

ANCIENT JEWISH ORDER KESHER SHEEL BARSEL.—The M. W. Grand Lodge of the Pacific Coast held their regular annual session on Sunday and Monday last, the 23d and 24th inst. The proceedings were very interesting, and showed the great progress the Order has been making of late. Being so young an institution yet on this Coast, and having to battle against different prejudices from the beginning, its success is really astonishing. It is now one of the recognized charitable organizations of this city. What at first seemed to be but a brilliant meteor, which though dazzling to the eye, was likely to disappear as quickly as it had appeared, has now become as fixed and luminous as one of the fixed stars which nightly dot the canopy of heaven. But charity is not its only object. All the virtues which graced the Jewish nation both in ancient and modern times are sought to be preserved and promulgated; all the vices that disgraced it, frowned down and eradicated. Some of our best citizens have united for the purpose, and the success that has attended the enterprise thus far fully realizes their most sanguine expectations. The Order counts about 300 members in this city. It has also lodges in Sacramento, New York, Jersey City, St. Louis and Detroit. On Monday evening, the following officers were installed by P. G. S. Bro. Meyer Morgenstern, for the ensuing term: M. W. Grand Saar, P. Franklin, of Sacramento, (re-elected); Deputy Grand Saar, Nathan Levy; Grand Nassi, A. J. Prager; Grand Sopher, Marcus Rosenthal (re-elected); Grand Gisher, A. S. Prager; Grand Cohen, G. Baum; Grand Thomer, M. Cohn; Grand Sh. Hap., Louis Licht. On the same occasion, Bro. P. Franklin was presented, with a costly gold head cane, appropriately inscribed, by the members of the Grand Lodge, in consideration of the eminent services he has rendered the Order. Bro. M. Levy, who presented the same in behalf of the members, expressed his sentiments in a very happy style, paying a glowing tribute to the recipient. Bro. Franklin, in expressing his thanks, made some very pertinent and eloquent remarks.—S. F. Hebrew.

THE ENGLISH EMBASSY.—The President's nomination of Gen. McClellan for the position of Minister to England disappointed those who fondly hoped that he had some sense of propriety left. The Washington correspondent of the New York Herald, in a late letter announced that Reverdy Johnson was likely to be appointed, and commented as follows:

His nomination would certainly be ratified by the Senate, for no Conservative in Congress stands so well with the Republican party. Mr. Johnson, though considerably advanced in years, retains his wonted vigor of health and intellect and possesses every requisite to make an accomplished representative of this country abroad. It may be added, however, that well-informed persons have announced that Mr. Seward is likely to be the successor of Mr. Adams at the Court of St. James. It is believed that he is in full accord with the President in regard to the proper policy to be pursued by the United States as well in the Alabama as in the adopted citizen question, which are now prominently before the two Governments for final settlement.

PLENTY OF DEER.—The Sage Brush of February 22d says:

The deep snow upon the mountains surrounding Honey Lake Valley has driven large herds of deer into the lower valleys. Upwards of 500 have been captured within the last month, some of which are of the largest ever seen in the country. Thousands of them are still frisking about unmolested, almost within sight of the town. More might be taken, and the number suffer no damaging diminution, but the citizens of this section have no use for them.
