Elliott Hixson vs. Pixley & McConnell. On motion demurrer withdrawn. Defendants have twenty days to answer.

T. Coffin vs. Pixley & McConnell; same order as in above case.

E. James vs. Alexander Lepore. No. 1. Anton bel complaint argued and submitted.

E. James vs. Alexander Lepore. No. 2. Demurrer argued and submitted.

Court adjourned until May 17.
