A DEPLORABLE CASE.—A little more than a year ago, a man named Fraser was sent to the State Prison from White Pine County, for having shot a man in a quarrel. The prisoner was in very delicate health, but he was blessed with a devoted wife, who followed him to this city, so as she could be within call should he be taken seriously ill. To support herself she did odd work in different families. Two months ago it was decided to give Fraser a new trial, as evidence greatly in his favor, which was not adduced at the first trial, had been found. The Sheriff of White Pine County came here for Fraser, but he had so much confidence in the man that he permitted him to wander about without a guard; in fact, if we are not mistaken, he was allowed to go to the scene of his trial without an officer. His wife, though, had to remain here, as she did not have sufficient money to accompany him. Yesterday she received a letter from her husband, in which he stated that he had again been attacked with lung troubles, and knowing that she had no money with which to pay her passage to his bedside, he bid her farewell, as he was dying. The poor, devoted wife's desperation can well be understood without describing it. Some kind and charitable citizens hearing of the sad case, made up a purse to enable Mrs. Fraser to go to her dying husband, which she did last night. She wishes to express her warmest and unspeakable thanks to the real Christians who so nobly assisted her in the darkest hour of her life.

A CURIOSITY.—A miner named Harry Maher from Virginia, went out to the Ayres & Hopkins mine on Wednesday, at the request of some Comstock parties, and descended the shaft to examine the property. Wedged between two layers of quartz he found a petrified fish, in perfect form, resembling in all details, the smelt which is caught in the bay of San Francisco. He took the petrification, which must have been buried in that mine for thousands of years, to Virginia, and will place it on exhibition.
