

LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

TO BULLIONVILLE ON THE NEVADA CENTRAL R. R.

By invitation of Capt. H. H. Day we made a trip last Thursday on the Nevada Central R. R. to Condor Canyon and Bullionville.

The train was to have started about half-past nine, but owing to the difficulty in making it up to accommodate the passengers it did not get off from the summit until quarter after 11.

The train reached Bullionville at 3 o'clock, and many of the passengers were pretty hungry. Some of the ladies had stopped at Mrs. Lehigh's, at the Canyon, preferring to have a good dinner there to going to Bullionville.

Several car-loads of ore were also carried to the mill at Bullionville, also a car-load of lumber and supplies. Two ladies and two gentlemen rode in front of the locomotive both going and returning.

Moore et al., Sheal et al., Ebrman and Livingston & Co. vs. M. Quillen; on motion the Court orders that defendant have to and including March 31st in which to file and serve his answers in each of the above entitled cases.

Wells, Fargo & Co. vs. Lincoln county; the demurrer filed herein on motion is allowed to be withdrawn, the answer being presented and filed in open Court.

Mathews vs. Johnston; case continued until Saturday, March 17th.

The Gettysburg Mining Company (limited) vs. the Techticup Gold and Silver Mining Company et al.; plaintiff in open Court moves that said cause be dismissed at the cost of plaintiff without prejudice to the commencement of another action.

State Bank vs. L. V. Loomis and J. D. Whetsel; L. V. Loomis having been adjudged by the United States District Court of the State of Nevada to be a bankrupt, all proceedings in the above entitled cause are ordered stayed, pending such adjudication, as far as L. V. Loomis is concerned.

In the matter of the estate of Earl Hamilton, deceased; the returned account of the sales of real estate filed, and Monday, March 26th, fixed as the day for hearing said return.

A venire was ordered issued for the names of 24 persons to serve as trial jurors, made returnable Monday, March 19th, at 11 A. M.

THE EGG TRICK.—Our grocers and provision dealers have had considerable trouble lately to procure eggs, with which to supply customers, without paying a higher price for them than what they could be sold for, owing to certain parties intercepting Mormon teams in the lower portion of the town and buying the entire contents, thus making a corner in the market.

AN ACCIDENT.—Ex-Senator N. Westcott, of Lincoln county, now employed in making surveys of the Richmond and Eureka Consolidated mines, at Eureka, had a narrow escape from serious injury on the 8th inst. while in the latter mine.

RAYMOND AND ELY MINE.—Considerable work is now being done in this mine. Work is progressing satisfactorily at different points, the indications being very favorable for striking good ore before long.

ONE FROM LEEDS.—Billy Goodman and Alfred Grant arrived in town on Wednesday last with about thirty tons of ore from Harrisburg Mining District, which will be worked at the Alps mill.

LEEDS' ITEMS.

By private letter dated March 10th received in Pioche, we have the following items in regard to Harrisburg Mining District, Utah: Times in this vicinity seem to be on the improve.

Several mines have been incorporated, and they are prosecuting the work very vigorously. There has also been a new town located; it is near the Toquerville Silver Mining Company's mine.

A company from Salt Lake City have started to build a twenty-stamp mill within a thousand feet of the new town. Everything looks prosperous for its future existence, and in a very short time it will rival any of the numerous towns in the District.

The Harrisburg mine has also a large force of men employed and are prospecting their ground with great vigor. This Company has 600 feet of ground and are sinking three different shafts, showing large bodies of ore in each of them.

Two miners had a quarrel on Sunday last, which resulted in one of them, named Mickey Free, being cut by the other, named Hoag, a man from Montana. The blade of the knife entered between the shoulders to the depth of 3 1/2 inches. It is thought the wound is fatal.

FIRE.—An alarm of fire was sounded on Wednesday last about 1 1/2 o'clock. It was found to proceed from a Chinese laundry on Main street, near Panaca Flat, formerly occupied by Hop Sing, but latterly by a lot of Indians.

The Hose Companies and Hook and Ladder were promptly on the ground, and Pioche Hose Company had just attached their nozzle and turned on the water when the nozzle came out from the plug, thus rendering it useless as far as the hose was concerned.

Buckets, however, were procured, filled with water, and with their aid and chopping down the rear portion of the house the fire was extinguished. How the fire occurred is not known, but as Billy Goodman was expected in town that day, it was thought that the Indians wished to give him a show to do some hard work when he arrived.

D. M. TYRRELL returned to Pioche on Sunday last from a trip to Virginia City and San Francisco. He states that times in Virginia City are very dull; that at least five thousand men are out of employment, and many of them, it is safe to say, do not get a square meal a day, and in consequence there is much suffering.

REMOVED.—Eugene Hazard was removed on Saturday last from the house he occupied on Meadow Valley street to the lodging house of D. Turner on Main street, where he will be enabled to have better care and attention.

A NIMROD.—Dancy Clark left Pioche on Saturday last for Eagle Valley on a hunting expedition, returning on Monday last about noon, giving him about a day's leisure for a good hunt.

BRACE BROKEN.—On Thursday morning last the Hamilton and Eureka stage had just started from Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express office, when one of the braces of the wagon snapped in two. This necessitated a stop for a couple of hours to repair damages.

FOR VIRGINIA CITY.—Bill McDonald, who has for a long time past been foreman of the Meadow Valley and Raymond & Ely mines, left Pioche on Tuesday last for Virginia City.

GRASS.—Grass is coming up finely in Meadow Valley Wash and ranchers have the promise of a good crop of hay.

G. R. CURRINO, formerly a druggist in Pioche, is now in Trinidad, Colorado.

THE LATEST STYLE.—The "clinging"

The following business was transacted: Theo. A. Hale was unanimously elected President of the Company, and M. Sullivan, Foreman. The monthly dues were reduced to 50 cents per month. It was passed unanimously that the first Monday night in each month be the regular meeting nights of the Company.

NOR SO.—Some interested parties have been circulating reports around Silver Reef and Harrisburg Mining District, Utah, to the effect that the Assessor of Lincoln county intended after the 1st of April, 1877, to levy a tax on the bullion proceeds of ore that came from those places to Pioche for reduction.

CHANGING THE ROAD.—The change of roads has not been made yet on the Salt Lake route, but it is thought that it will be done during the coming week.

GOOD ONE.—Pete Medlin arrived from

Harrisburg Mining District, Utah, the first part of the week with several wagon loads of ore from that place, which was worked at the Alps mill.

ALPS COMPANY.—The Alps Company's mill in Pioche still keeps running steadily on custom ore and ore from the mine, the Conder on concentrations and tailings. There was a rumor around the streets last evening to the effect that a big strike had been made in the mine, all the men at work having been shut down.

LEEDS BULLION.—The Leeds Silver Mining Company continue their shipments of bullion, five bars valued at \$5,031.56 having arrived on Sunday last, and four bars valued at \$3,919.14, on Wednesday; total value, \$8,950.70.

Tax Eureka Sentinel of March 14th says "James Day, a son of Superintendent Day of the Raymond & Ely mine of Pioche, was among the arrivals Monday night. He is destined for Pioche."

BULLION.—Bullion to the amount of \$6,288.39 was shipped from Pioche by Wells, Fargo & Co. during the past week. This bullion is the product of the Alps and Condor mills.

RETURNED.—State Senator A. J. Blair returned here yesterday, he having made a short stay in San Francisco since the adjournment of the Legislature.
