SOME OF OUR NEW FEATURES.

The field of journalism is so very limited here as to afford but little room for varying from the old routine which has always characterized the Carson press; and while we cannot expect to startle this community with the exhibition of novelties; and while it would be the height of extravagant folly for us to attempt such impossibilities as the publication of full (or even condensed) telegraphic reports; and absurd as it would be for us to branch out into the realms of big newspaperdom; we cannot, in reason, be expected to surpass our worthy local contemporary in much besides an exhibition of our inherent goodness and amiability (our well-known distinctive qualities); but we are unlike our neighbor, the Register in so far as we do not intrude our journalistic lucubrations upon the sacredness of the Christian Sabbath—for, as will be observed, we publish on Monday and not on Sunday mornings. May our example not be lost upon our unregenerated neighbor!

Another of our new features—and this, no joking, is something worth while—is what appears to-day for the first time in Carson (first time since the early days, at any rate) namely: correct and full reports of the evening transactions of the San Francisco Stock Board. This will enable us to accommodate our friends here and on the river considerably in advance of any other papers.

So fast as other possible improvements suggest themselves we shall make them.

TAILLESS TROUT IN SCOTLAND.—At the late meeting of the British Association some so-called tailless trout were exhibited, which were said to occur in considerable numbers in a certain loch in Scotland, about a thousand feet above the level of the sea, and about one acre in extent. It is so shallow that a man can wade through it, and has a stony bottom, with a few weeds. Although surrounded by other lochs, the tailless trout were found exclusively in the one in question. The precise nature of the mutilation was not given. It was stated in the discussion which ensued upon the exhibition of this specimen that in other localities in Great Britain there were streams in which trout without tails, and sometimes without other fins, were not uncommon.

"ANYTHING TO BEAT GRANT."

Mr. Beck, one of the Democratic leaders in the House of Representatives, lately made one of the charges against the Democratic Administration which are now the chief cry of the alliance against the Republican party. Mr. Beck's charge is a good illustration of the kind of warfare that is waged upon the President. It was as follows: "During the last fiscal year, in defiance of that law [act of July 12th, 1870], the War Department, as is shown by the report of the Secretary of the Treasury, expended \$8,000,000 in excess of the appropriations, and sold arms to the French to make good the deficiency; and the proceeds of those arms are now deposited in the Treasury to the credit of that Department, subject to be drawn out by it." The Secretary of War, in a letter to Mr. Daws, remarks that Mr. Beck is in error at all points, and proceeds in the tersest and most conclusive manner to prove it. The War Department did not expend any sums in excess of appropriation; it did not sell arms to make good the deficiency; even if there were a deficiency, the money to the credit of ordinance stores could not be used to make it good; the proceeds of the sales mentioned are not in the Treasury to the credit of the War Department, nor subject to its order. The Secretary leaves little of Mr. Beck.

Mr. Fernando Wood made an attack of the usual kind upon General Dyer, Chief of the Ordinance Department, to which the general replied in a letter so conclusive that Mr. Wood retracted his charges. It is by the incessant reiteration of such charges that the campaign is conducted of anything and anybody to beat Grant.

NEW POSTAL CONVENIENCES.

The new postal bill enacted before Congress rose, authorizes one cent postal cards for correspondence or for printed circulars, similar to those which were introduced in Great Britain nearly two years ago and are now in use in nearly all European countries. Whether the card shall be provided by a flap to cover and conceal the writing is for the Postmaster to decide, who is said to prefer the open card, and will order that kind only to be manufactured. The face of the card will bear a one cent stamp, and will be provided with lines for the address, and the back will be ruled for the letter. The price of the card and stamp will be only one cent. It will probably be three or four weeks before they will be ready for sale, as the plates for printing have yet to be prepared. The postage on circulars, newspapers and other transient printed matter, which under the old law was two cents for every four ounces or less; small circulars, which formerly cost two cents can now be sent for one cent, an important reduction to business men who use the mails largely to advertise their business. The change is now in force, the law being immediate in its effects.
