THE LATEST TELEGRAMS.

General Sherman is coming home in the Steamer Baltic.

The statement comes from New York that the late Auditor, Watson, kept books on the Ring thieves and that said books will be produced with damaging effect when the Tweed trial takes place.

The trumped-up copperhead charge against Secretary Bontwell to the effect that he was bribed to vote for Union Pacific R. R. bills is exploded by the examination of the House Records which show that he, as a member of Congress, voted against all those bills.

Governor Jewell of Connecticut predicts 2,000 majority in that State for Grant.

Charles O'Connor refuses to be interviewed concerning the Louisville nomination.

Delegates to the great mass convention of soldiers and sailors are flocking into Pittsburg.

A Times Geneva special says that the award made to the United States by the Tribunal of Arbitration will only exceed three million pounds by a trifle. The decision of the Court is signed by all the arbitrators except Sir Alexander Cockburn, who will give a separate judgment, agreeing with his colleagues only in relation to the Alabama award, which case constitutes the greater portion of the total sum. Damages were granted in the case of the Florida by a vote of four against one, and in the case of the Shenandoah by three against two. All the other cases presented by the American Government were dismissed by the Court. The Times says: "Willingly will we content to pay this sum to improve the law of nations."

Another dispatch says that the Arbitrators awarded the United States fifteen millions of dollars in gold; that Sir Alex. Cockburn refused to sign the award, and that there were twenty-two guns fired by the Genevese in honor of the arbitration.

President Thiers visited the American man-of-war Shenandoah at Havre and was received with distinguished honors.

The San Franciscans are still masquerading over the Atlantic and Pacific railroad scheme.

Last week more than one thousand tons of wheat were shipped from San Francisco.

THE TROTTER MARES.—The celebrated mares Goldsmith Maid and Lucy, says the Reno Journal, passed through here on yesterday morning for California. We find the following description of "equine luxury on wheels" in the Cleveland (Ohio) Herald: "Budd Doble has constructed a palace car for the transportation of his famous trotters, Goldsmith Maid and Lucy. It is painted in a handsome manner, and bears upon its side the inscription, 'Budd Doble's Special Car.' Upon entering the car you step into a small outer apartment in which is a lounge and other articles of furniture. Opening a door upon one side, you enter the main portion of the car devoted to the horses. Here are four stalls, the sides of each being thickly padded with hair, and covered with enameled cloth. The center of the car is devoted to trunks, chests, hay, etc. At either end of the car, on the roof is a tank, each capable of holding eighty gallons of water. Underneath the center of the car is a capacious box with doors, in which the mares pass in and out of the car. The car is furnished with the most improved passenger car trucks, as adopted by the Pennsylvania Railroad; also with the Westinghaus air brake. The entire length of the car is fifty feet, and of the usual width of passenger cars. This car is to take the mares to California.
