PRIMARY ELECTION.

On Saturday the Republican party of this county held its primary election to elect delegates to the State and County Conventions. Two tickets were in the field, one denominated the Nye, and the other the Jones ticket.

For Delegates to the County Convention.—Fred. Stadtmuller, Adam Welter, J. A. Hoover, Dan. Haugh, John Richey, H. Goodwin.

For Delegates to the State Convention.—D. B. Lyman, John Hanson.

The vote this year was much smaller than in 1870, when Carson City precinct polled 463 votes, of which the Trittle delegates had an average of 234 and the Batterman 221 votes.

In Empire precinct, same year, the Trittle delegates received 73 votes (Lyman and Hanson) to 34 for Hamilton and Sabin, the Batterman delegates.
