## THE LATEST TELEGRAMS.

Horace Greeley, following in the zig-zag footsteps of his illustrious predecessors, will begin on Wednesday to swing around the circle of the Ohio and Mississippi valley States, presenting the flag of our country with its thirty-seven stars; our gellorions constitution: full amnesty to rebels and complete damnation to President Grant; distributing meanwhile, some tracts concerning the beet crop and the corruption and nepotism of the potato-bug; and waving his cream-colored locks in the September breeze. Go west, young man; go west!

Attorney General Williams who is one of the coolest headed men in the Republic and one of our best lawyers, is of the opinion that the Geneva arbitration has awarded Uncle Sam all that he had reason to expect. Considering that there was but one representative of a government of Republican form on that tribunal we think Mr. Williams is quite right.

The probabilities now are that Greeley will be worse beaten in this State than John D. Winters was in 1866—or worse, by several hundred votes, than Seymour was in 1868. Grant's majority will not be less than twelve hundred, and it will probably reach fifteen hundred.

THE PLACED ARGUS.—This is the title of a new Republican weekly paper which has just made its appearance in Auburn, California. It is under the editorial control of Mr. James B. McQuillan, a very vigorous and capable writer. It ought to succeed; for it is "well set in the field" and preaches the true political gospel. Good luck to it.
