BALTIMORE, September 21.—The Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows adjourned sine die to-day. Previous to the adjournment the new officers were installed and M. W. Grand Sire Logan made an eloquent address after which he announced the following appointments of officers of the Grand Lodge: Rev. J. W. Venable, Kentucky, R. W. Grand Chaplain; Caleb Reed, Massachusetts, R. W. Grand Marshal; Albert Cohen, Arkansas, R. W. Guardian; J. W. Hudson, Wisconsin, R. W. Grand Messenger. No other place being designated, Baltimore will be the place of meeting of the next Grand Lodge.

The Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows in Secret Session last night instructed the Committee on Secret Work to prepare a revision of the Ritual and Report at the next session. Much of the unwritten work was transferred to the Charge book. The change takes effect on the 1st of January next. The price of cards and dismissal certificates was fixed at fifteen cents each. The Finance Committee estimated the receipts and expenditures for the past year as follows: Receipts, including the balance on hand, \$59,490 03; expenditures, \$39,152 96.
