**SOMETHING CONCERNING THE MALICIOUS AND LYING ABUSE OF A GOOD CITIZEN.**

**A Plea for its Abatement.**

There is in the Reno *Crest* of the 21st inst. the greater part of a column of printed matter purporting to be an anonymous letter from Carson City wherein much venomous abuse is flung upon those friends of Senator Nye who participated in the primary election which took place here on the 14th inst. This printed matter taken as a whole, is the most shamelessly untruthful account of that event that a mendacious ingenuity could devise. The comparison of that very decently conducted affair to the political performances of the Five Points is one of those instances of forced and wanton vilification which betray the premeditated malignity of their authors; and the general tenor of the account is so extravagantly false and so much in violation of the rules which govern respectable journalism as to be absolutely shameful; but outrageous as this portion of the purported communication is, it is far surpassed by the coarse and libelous slanders which follow and which are meant to cast aspersions upon Mr. H. F. Rice, the well known and much respected Carson Agent of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Express and the Superintendent of the Carson Branch Mint. In order that it may be known what the character-thief who wrote this real or pretended communication has been guilty of, we herewith defile our columns with an extract from the body of his gratuitous slanderings:

"Oh, it would have been a treat could you have seen the circumstances that attended and which respected individual, H. F. Rice. Curse not loud but deep were poured forth as he walked the streets, and on Monday he commenced his raid on all unfortunate debtors to the firm of Wells, Fargo & Co. He would sneak up to an unfortunate creditor who had worked against Jas. W. and with base ingratitude, hiss in his ear: 'Call at the office forthwith,' at the same time he seemed to be looking all over the body of the offender as if selecting the most eligible locality from which to take his pound of flesh. Some of the defeated candidates and delegates followed suit; every little account against apostate members of the party was hauled up and payment demanded with Siskiyew territory."

That this is a most mean, unwarranted and deliberately concocted lie no man that knows Mr. Rice will need be told. There is not the slightest foundation for such a statement; and there can be no excuse offered for making it. Mr. Rice is one of the oldest and most respectable citizens of Carson; is recognized as such by the Directors of the Banking and Express Company whose agent he is and by the business community by whom he is surrounded; and he has never allowed politics to interfere with or give shape or influence to his business; and he needs no vindication at our hands from the foul and false-tongued scoundrel who has thus dared to traduce his character and motives; and while this which we have said upon the subject is not meant to be given or accepted in the light of such vindication, we do mean it as in denunciation of the author and willing publisher of this most outrageous calumny.

And now let us ask: Has it come to this, that no respectable gentleman may take an active part in politics without

incurring the risk of being thus maligned by every blackguard who can gain access to the columns of a newspaper? Moreover, let us ask: Are the friends of Governor Nye to continue to receive these delugings of villification at the hands of the conductors and correspondents of the mis-styled "Independent" press whose columns, meanwhile, seem to be always suspiciously favorable to John P. Jones? Are the partizans of that gentleman willing to have it made to seem as if there were no honest or trustworthy Republicans save those who have professed a preference for him? We will not disguise our reason for asking these questions. It is in the following gingerly mention of Mr. Jones—the concluding paragraph of the purported communication from which we have excerpted as above:

J. P. Jones has carried the primaries under the belief of the people that he is antagonistic to the "rings," should his future course prove this fact he will probably be United States Senator; but one thing is certain, he has to show and maintain a record as clear as holy writ to win.

And now let us say that we have long since discovered such a leaning in Jones' favor upon the part of the self-styled Liberal Republicans of this neighborhood and their representatives and organs as to make us half suspect that they are warranted, in so far as himself or his managers may give them warrant, in thus heaping abuse upon the Nye men, while, at the same time, they are particularly tender of Mr. Jones and his performances. If our suspicions are not well founded; if there is, in genuine earnest, so much of pure and unselfish love in the heart of any Democrat or Republican desirer as to gush thus voluntarily for the man who now seems to be the only formidable Republican aspirant to the Senate, we shall regret having used that gentleman's name in connection with this matter. If, on the contrary, he places a lesser value upon Radical Republican support than upon the faint praise of himself which can be distilled, by implication, from Copperhead and Liberal abuse of the minority of his party, he is prepared to pursue a course which in the end, may seriously injure his own standing and impair the harmony of the party by whose favor alone he has any right to expect an elevation to the place of his ambition. We say this from the very best of motives, no less a motive, in fact, than the inducing of a formal and early repudiation by himself of these slanderers, who, by abusing and bearing false witness against Nye and his friends, and systematically following such abuses by some contrasted compliments to Mr. Jones would seem to be attempting to injure the one with coarse abuse and stab the other in the back of his friends.

We cannot consent that so prominent and influential a Republican should thus be made use of to cast a fire brand into the ranks of his party. It is a bad destination for any Republican, not to be an object of Democratic assault. The taint of the implied friendship of the Copperheads and soreheads is more than any sound Radical will endure. The common cause of Republicanism demands that we shall stand shoulder to shoulder when meeting the shock of battle with our now half-disguised enemies; and that when the struggle is at its height there should be no lagging factions in our ranks; no rivalries; no receiving of cheer and comfort from the foe; nothing but courage, determination, mutual trustings and closed ranks. This cannot be if those who hold high places in the party are silent when the good of the cause demands that they should tell the world that there is nothing less impassable between themselves and the supporters of Greeley and Brown than the deep gulf upon whose banks must ever be fought the irrepressible conflict between Republicanism and Democracy.
