## STATE MATTERS.

### Lincoln County.

We glean as follows from the Daily Record: The delegates to the Republican State Convention from Lincoln County are as follows: A. J. Blair, Alex. Brown, J. P. Walk and Lewis Felsenthal.

The Chief of the Hill is turning out large quantities of ore which ranges from \$150 to \$350 per ton.

The Washington and Creole Mining Company have their machinery ready for operations.

### White Pine County.

We condense as follows from the News of September 20: Of the hold-over Senatorial matter, the News says:  
One of our Senators is a Democrat, the other does not like Grant. A United States Senator is to be elected next Winter, and the Democrats and all who do not like Grant will combine in an effort to elect, as successor to Nye, some man who does not like Grant. Some of the best authorities in law matters assert unreservedly that our two State Senators forfeited their places by failing to take any action to arrange the duration of their official terms. To lay the subject over, and await the course of the Democrats upon it, is not the proper course—somebody will be voted for in the two places, and we want to see the Republican party put forward regular nominations. We have no purpose to serve, and the public has no interest to benefit, by allowing the two incumbents to work a job on the two parties for their own private advantage.

### Lander County.

From the Reese River Revue of the 20th, we learn the following facts regarding the action of the Republican County Convention which was held in Austin on Thursday last:  
The following gentlemen were selected as delegates to the State Convention: John O. Darrow, L. C. McKenny, J. M. Hamner, M. A. Sawtelle, F. G. Howell, James Mason and A. E. Shannon.  
The delegates to the State Convention were instructed to present the names of C. C. Goodwin, for Congress, and T. P. Hawley for Supreme Judge, and use all honorable efforts to secure their nomination.  
The new Central Committee is composed of the following gentlemen: C. F. Horn, Chairman; A. E. Shannon, Secretary; T. W. Triplett, Treasurer; J. F. Ramsey, L. W. Cromer, C. C. Wallace, Wm. Head, John Frost and R. Carter.

### Washoe County.

According to the State Journal, Reno has a brass band; Jim Kinkead is the leader and E flat cornet player. The same paper says that the roof of the new Court House has been completed and that the plastering is soon to begin.

### Humboldt County.

The Silver State, from which we gather as follows, says that prosperity prevails at Golconda. There are 23,000 sheep thereabout and 200,000 pounds of wool have been shipped thence. The crops of cereals are heavy and good. The story that there is an infectious disorder amongst the cattle in Humboldt county is, in the language of H. G., A LIE! There are 250 or 300 persons in Paradise Valley and there is a school house, a flouring mill and two or three stores there. The Indians are peaceable. The grain crop is estimated at 8,000,000 pounds. Kohtz Kinkead, an Alaska Indian boy, adopted by Mr. J. H. Kinkead, died of consumption at Unionville last week. Such is generally the result of successful attempts at taming the aborigines. So soon as they become domesticated they are apt to die. When they don't die they run away. One Spors, a Humboldt rancher, has raised 300 pounds of "pearl" potatoes from four pounds of seed.

### Elko County.

A little son of McComb of Lamoille Valley, was thrown from a wagon and killed by the wheels passing over him.
