THE REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION. ITS DUTY TO THE PARTY.

The Representatives of the Republican party of the State of Nevada who will assemble at Reno to-morrow are charged with the performance of a singularly delicate mission, in so far as what they are called upon to do will have an effect upon the immediate and future prospects and standing of the political organization whose temporary agents and guardians they are. We will endeavor to explain why it is, in our estimation, a very difficult and delicate matter to perform with complete success the work which devolves upon this convention: The apparent majority of the Republican party in this State are very earnestly, or, at any rate, very vociferously in favor of the election of Mr. John P. Jones to the United States Senate. In consequence of the position within the party thus suddenly awarded him, Mr. Jones can, if he will, (and as he has, perhaps, a right to) dictate the action of the convention—or, at any rate, so shape the course of its proceedings as to induce the adoption of what may seem best to him and his friends—the presumption being that their first object is to strengthen his position so far as it can be strengthened by the popularity and acceptability of the State ticket. We don't mean to be understood as charging it upon the majority of the convention that their first preference is Jones and their next one the good of the Republican party; but we are anxious to impress upon him and his friends the necessity, or, at any rate, the good policy of naming a ticket which shall not seem to be wholly made up of the Jones faction—to remember, indeed, that in this party there are many preferences and that whatever may, in reason, be done to effect conciliation and a general sense of satisfaction, ought to be done. Mr. Jones has so large an influence in his power that he may if he acts wisely and judiciously do much to strengthen his party and make its nominees acceptable to the general mass of its members; and in order that he may be able to act thus beneficially for the whole party his real friends will, by self sacrifice, if needed, prove their unselfish devotion to him by stepping one side rather than that any demands of their own should embarrass his action. We are aware that our voluntary advocacy of Senator Nye's reelection would seem to disentitle us to the right to tender our advice to Mr. Jones; but at the risk of seeming intrusive and extra officious we have ventured to say what we have said; for, if Mr. Jones has it in his power to wield the machinery of the Republican party we have a right to demand that he shall do so for the greatest benefit of that party. Furthermore, he can in no wise serve his own cause more effectually than by employing his influence in allaying the friction of factional strife, healing the wounds of old rivalries and bringing about so much of a concession to the minority as the disappointed wing of a

political organization may, in reason be treated to. In what we have herein said we do not mean to counsel Mr. Jones to desert any one of his friends or to ignore their claims to his assistance in obtaining nominations; but we urge it upon those partisans of his not to insist upon his imperiling the success of his party and impairing his own strength by giving their claims so decided a preference as to make the State ticket seem the work of a faction and not the expressed preference of the whole party. We say this in the face of the declaration which we hope is needless, that the action of the State convention, whatever it may be, shall receive our heartiest support. But a very grave responsibility rests upon the majority of that body as well as upon Mr. Jones if he can influence its action; and we trust that they and he may act wisely and well.

A WORD CONCERNING THE SUPREME JUDGESHIP.

When called upon to indicate their preferences as to what Republican shall fill so important an office as that of a Justice of the Supreme Court, those into whose hands is intrusted the making of such a selection, should not hesitate to place in nomination for that position (if it be possible to select such a person) one whose capacities have been tried and found adequate, and of whose fitness there is no question. We believe in "politics in the Courts"—and in the pulpit, for that matter—but we feel that it is a most imperative demand upon our higher motives, that in choosing our Judges we should ignore, so far as possible, all petty considerations, all local prejudices, and all questions of mere personal favoritism. In other words, we ought to be careful not to bedraggle the ermine in the filthy pool of politics—not any more, we mean, than just enough to remind our judicial candidates of the allegiance they owe to the principles of our party. In this we mean to convey no insinuations against any one; but, instead, to remind the State Convention that the present Chief Justice, while his sense of propriety and his unwillingness to seem to be importunate for an office which should seek the man to fill it, declines to thrust himself forward for a nomination, is willing to leave it to the Convention to decide whether his name shall be used in connection with the candidacy for that office. In the name of the party and the Bench, we trust that the Convention may not fail to invite him to accept of a third election to the position he has filled with so much honor to himself and so much of good service to the tribunal of which, since Nevada became a State, he has been a most useful and respected member.

If there is anything more debilitating in the way of political nutriment than the very lean and diluted broth which sustains the poor snivellers who prate of the "One Term Principle," it is that translucent and attenuated gruel which is served out, in stated doses to the babes and sucklings who hope to be summoned, when all is over in this vain world of "corruption" to sit down in an endless state of political beatitude upon the right hand of Horace Greeley and there sing the Possumated doxologies of Liberalism through an endless eternity of "Reform"—"Grant's absence from Washington!"

In the first place, a man who is fool enough to pass the Summer in Washington when he has money enough to get away from there and when, as is the case with the President, during the recess of Congress, there is nothing to detain him there, isn't fit to be President; and in the second place it comes with a bad grace even from so pious a journalistic soul as our next door neighbor to make a fuss over Grant's absence from the national capital when the Democratic Governor of Nevada is not only habitually absent from the seat of government of his own State, but is wandering about in other "sovereignities," far out of his own bailiwick, and engaged in bovine meanderings, sheep shearings and bacolic cavortings of his own. Corral your regular Governor or shut up about our President.

THE SAN FRANCISCO ELEVATOR.—We welcome the above named good paper to our table. We acknowledge a splendid puff from its editor; and, by the way, we wondered who it could be that seemed to know us of old so well as the writer thereof seemed to; but when our eyes happened to note the name of "the responsible party" the full magnitude of the situation dawned on us—for Alexander Ferguson dates back to an acquaintanceship of our beardless days—and we are mighty glad to know that he is where he belongs, talking the gospel to his fellowmen.
