Mings, chairman, and all school teachers of the district; program and music, Dr. W. M. Wadleigh, chairman, George Annand, Mrs. Frank Millard, Mrs. J. C. Wheeler, Mrs. Neil McGill, Mrs. F. r. Nevin, Mrs. Dr. Pollock, Mrs. Dr. Woods, Mrs. Lewis, Mrs. W. N. McGill, Mrs. Jerry Kent; invitation, F. M. Root, C. R. Reeves and Frank McElroy; transportation, A. Valjean, S. W. Belford and Mayor F. M. Clark. W. S. Henderson was appointed to address East Ely school children on Friday afternoon preceding Decoration day and Rev. G. C. Hunting chosen orator of the day. The meeting was well attended and the enthusiasm in evidence such that no room remains for doubt but that Decoration day this year will be the most generally observed and heartily participated in that the district has known.

Site Is Good, But More Of It Wanted

The committee appointed by the city council to look into the matter of the new cemetery had a meeting with General Manager Arthur Smith at East Ely yesterday morning and requested increase of the allotment of ground to either 20 or 40 acres, preferably 40. Other features were stated to be satisfactory. Mr. Smith requested the committee to put their request in writing, stating that he would give it early consideration.
H. A. Comins, of the committee, said yesterday that the proposed site was all that could be asked as to location but that he would very much like to see 40 acres set aside instead of 10, this with view to needs of the future thickly populated district. Another thing to be considered, said Mr. Comins, was the several plots which the fraternal, church and labor organizations will ask for. Should ground be set aside for these, there will be but little left for those belonging to no organizations, should the cemetery contain but 10 acres.
