THE APPROACHING CONTEST.

If while the armies of the Republic and the cohorts of treason were struggling for the mastery, the loyal heart of the Republic followed with painful solicitude the current of the heady fight, and with its prayer for the success of the legions sworn to battle to the death for freedom and an undivided country, mingled a hope that triumph would bring a lasting Peace and a permanent settlement of the vexed questions which could only be decided by the arbitration of the sword, it was because charity which hopeth all things and endureth all things, refused to believe in the utter madness of the conspirators who struck at the national life and the total depravity of the meaner traitors who, afraid to venture into the field, lent the aid of their infamous councils in the national forum and the private circle.

Half a century of a policy which had used "all means to conciliate," four years of bloody contest with the spirit of enmity to humanity and to liberty, if we are to believe the signs of the times, seem to have been insufficient to fix the status of the American Nation, to convince its intestine enemies, that the heritage transmitted to this people from the Fathers of the Republic shall remain to them intact, that what we battled for, from Bull Run to the Gulf shall not be wrested from us.

The public enemy refuse to acknowledge that the integrity of the Republic and the equality of man before the law have been established upon American soil.

That this proposition will be denied by the leaders of the party in opposition to these distinctive tenets of that organization represented by the Congress of the United States, may reasonably be expected. To suppose that the denial or assertion of any proposition by these men, can amount to anything more than the establishment of the converse of whatever they deny or assert, is to take that for granted, which their whole past history clearly and incontrovertibly demonstrates.

And thus it is that the loyal men of America find themselves once more face to face with their political foes, and called upon to re-assert at the ballot box, the principles for the vindication of which their brethren have poured out their blood like water, and they have given their treasure with unsparring hands.

And here and now let it be understood that the "trumpet which gives an uncertain sound," can never marshal this host to the conflict. The "fearful and the unbelieving" may never hope to lead the vanguard of the army about to be arrayed.

That cautious deference to difference of opinion, which hesitates between a denunciation of the supporters of "any policy," and the fear of losing a vote in the State Convention, will not do for the man who aspires to obtain a place upon the State ticket of the Union Party of Nevada. And as but a short time can reasonably be expected to elapse between this time and the inauguration of the contest which is to decide the political complexion of Nevada for four years, we simply suggest that those who expect favors must decide upon a clear, unmistakable endorsement of that uncompromising spirit of opposition to the machinations of traitors which found its expression in the voice and votes of the late Congress, and which we may expect to see repudiated by the Rebel concave about to assemble in Philadelphia.

The Sacramento Union has the following first-rate notice of the convention, called to assemble at Carson City on the 12th proximo. Speaking of the invitation extended to the faithful, by McCorkle et al., it says:

Under this invitation of Peace Democrats, who had not courage enough to leave the Pacific coast and fight in the armies of the rebellion, rebels of all kinds, reconstructed and otherwise, and fished Union men of Doolittle and Thurlow Weed stamp, can cordially participate in the political lose-feast. It will indeed be a motley assemblage. In that Convention there will be all sorts and conditions of men, like those who were with David at Adullam, viz: "Every one that was in distress and every one that was in debt, and every one that was discontented." It will be an interesting sight when these men meet in council to witness their political shades and complexions. Their schemes will come to naught, however, for the Union organization in Nevada is too firm and compact to be shaken by mere place seekers.

A CANDID ADMISSION.

The Virginia Union took occasion to remark not long since, that:

Conspiracies against a nation's liberties, and parties which have their origin in crime and wickedness, (especially when attended with temporary success) "are things that die hard." They have the spirit of the devil in them, and the tail end of such combinations of sin "will wobble" a long while after the head has had a bullet sent through it.

The spasmodic struggles of the Democracy at this present writing, is singularly confirmatory of this remarkable instance of a journal in that interest confining itself to facts. We shall not too curiously inquire how that journal happened to hit upon the truth on the occasion referred to. Let us take the good the Gods send us. The expression above quoted, may have been, and probably was, inadvertently made; but for all that, it shines with all that beautiful force of contrast, that lends such a distinctive brilliance to—a rich jewel in an Ethiop's ear.

AN APOLOGY DEMANDED.

Vallandigham informs Raymond of the New York Times, that he and his friend Fernando Wood et al. *omne genus*, expect all members of the Philadelphia Convention, who cannot produce certificates of incarceration in some one of the Tyrant Lincoln's Bastilles, or at least produce satisfactory evidence of having been kicked out of a Federal camp, to apologize to them for whatever they may have said or written of them, of an uncompromising nature during the late disturbances. Their apologies having been tendered and accepted, the *entiate corVile*, will be re-established and they will be permitted to take back seats at the Philadelphia Convention. When we reflect upon the nature of the imputations under which Val, and his fellows have been compelled to writhe for a few years, their forbearance in demanding and their magnanimity in accepting so slight a recompense for their wrongs becomes strikingly apparent. Great is "cheek" and Vallandigham is the prophet thereof.

BY STATE TELEGRAPH.

[From the Virginia Union of yesterday.]
 New York, Aug. 5.—Five messages from Europe by Cable were received today.

The Commercial's money article says the slight reaction in stocks noted yesterday continues today. Government securities quiet but steady. Reports are current that private dispatches have been received quoting 5-20's at London yesterday at 68, but we are unable to authenticate the rumor. The report that large orders were received by Cable yesterday for 5-20's appear to have been intended for effect upon the gold premium. Large shipments of bonds will, however, be made to-morrow at Board quotations for Government securities were unchanged, except for old 5-20's, which were one-eightieth lower.

Ottawa, C. W., Aug. 5.—Complimentary greetings passed through the Atlantic Cable between the Queen and the Canadian Government. One of the messages took only eleven minutes to pass from Newfoundland to London.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—Attorney General Stansbury has given his opinion that the nomination rejected by the Senate can be legally made by the President during recess.

The President has appointed Wm. F. Johnson Collector of the Port of Philadelphia, and O. B. Stoneker three times rejected as Assessor of Internal Revenue, Philadelphia.

Secretary Browning has, under a law passed at the late session of Congress, appointed J. Ross Browne Commissioner to collect mining statistics in the States and Territories west of the Rocky Mountains. He will proceed to the Pacific coast by the steamer on the 11th. This is an important mission, and will embrace statistics of products of bullion, population engaged in mining, description of mineral lands, capital, cost of labor, etc. Application has been made to the General Land Office to have the land which will be occupied by Sutro's Tunnel, through the Comstock lode of Nevada gold mines, withdrawn from market.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 3.—Martial law has been withdrawn. The Grand Jury found indictments against twenty-five members of the Convention, and their trial before Judge Abell will now proceed.

THE FASHIONS.—A late Paris letter says: "Fashions are still small—smaller than ever. Skirts narrower day by day. A piece of tulle tied under the chin, with a bow or flower on the top, is a bonnet. In France the old Empire costumes are rapidly gaining ground. The Empress is determined they shall become the fashion. A short circular tippet, not quite reaching to the waist, is much in vogue just now, and considered very *commode*. The light jackets are thought common."

A colored girl in Georgia has had a suit for breach of promise of marriage against a negro man. It is the first case of the kind ever known in Georgia.
